Flooding overtakes Ottawa River banks in UCPR

ROCKLAND – Flooding of properties along the northern edge of the United Counties of Prescott-Russell beside the Ottawa River continues and there is no quick end in sight. Hundreds of people have been evacuated from Clarence-Rockland, Plantagenet and from other locations near the river's edge. Ferries across the Ottawa River from Quyon to Cumberland to Thurso have ceased running, and towns like Ste-Anne de Bellevue and Rigaud on the St. Lawrence are also dealing with significant flooding. In fact, any properties alongside creeks, rivers or lakes in Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec are under flood warning, meaning flooding is occurring or is imminent. In the City of Ottawa the Chaudiére Bridge is being carefully watched as the roaring run-off is only a couple of feet

below the bridge.

On Mon., May 8, Champlain Township also announced evacuations due to flooding of the South Nation River near L'Orignal. Premier Kathleen Wynne visited Rockland on Mon., May 8, where she met with local MPPs Grant Crack and Marie-France Lalonde, then continued on to L'Orignal. Heavy rains throughout Ontario and further east, immediately following the spring snow melt, have swollen waterways beyond capacity. In the South Nation watershed, the spring snow melt caused the Castor and South Nation Rivers and their tributaries to crest about two weeks ago. Additional precipitation, including two rainstorms last week which each dropped 25mm (about one inch) have now raised water levels high above the normal crest. 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Dundas Farmers Charity Gala donates funds to local charities

WILLIAMSBURG – On March 25, the Dundas Farmers Charity Gala held their 2017 event, "An Evening of Recognition." Along with inducting five community leaders into the Dundas Agricultural Hall of Fame, the Gala raised \$12,000 worth of donations. The funds were raised through the evening's silent and live auctions as well as in-kind community donations.

On Wed., May 3, Kelly-Jacqueline Pemberton, Chair of the Dundas Farmers Gala Committee, started the day at the Dundas County Hospice in Williamsburg. After a brief tour of the house, Kelly-Pemberton was pleased to present the hospice with a check for \$8,000.

The money will go towards building a new accessibility ramp for the front entrance of the house.

The ramp will be similar to the one at the back of the house, built last year from the donations of the Gala. Building the ramp is local contractor Gary Whitford of Whitford Construction, located in Ingleside. Whitford was approached by the Gala in 2016 to build the first ramp. He eagerly obliged, adding, "We live in this township and we want to help in whatever way we can." Whitford said the project takes approximately two weeks to build with the help of his five guys. He is hoping to have the project underway by early June.

Kelly-Pemberton said, "The Gala's donation will fund 80 per cent of the quoted project costs." The in-kind donations for the materials were provided by local lumber companies; Blacks Lumber, Lannin Home Building Centre, Building Morrisburg Centre, Winchester BMR and Cedar View Builders Supply Ltd.

Paul Renaud, Chair of the Hospice Board of Directors, was brimming with pride while receiving the donation. He said, "Without this kind of community support, the hospice would have a hard time staying afloat." He continued to thank the Gala Board of Directors, Committee members and community for their donations and continued support.

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Alongside Kelly-Pemberton at the cheque presentation were Gala Committee members Rose Stewart, representing Dundas County Cattlemen's Association, and Steven Byvelds, current President of the Dundas Federation of Agriculture. Kelly-Pemberton was eager to recognize Stewart as an integral part of organizing the Gala. Stewart's own mother was aided by the hospice in her time of need and Stewart said this was one of the ways she could





When Vankleek Hill's Beau's All Natural Brewing Company announced several months ago it planned to help build a craft brewery in Rwanda, where none now exists, some thought the plan a little farfetched.

But we're talking about Beau's! Over the past decade since the organic beer manufacturer set up shop in a former leather factory, the company has shown nothing but an innovative approach, from bringing its employees into the fold as minority owners, to the eclectic variety of beverages it produces.

It has also shown a tendency to give back to the community through various projects and a habit of thinking big. It's really no surprise then that, for the Beauchesne family, the world is its community and it would want to offer its services where viable.

On a commercial basis, the company has also investigated China for future expansion. However, that plan is on hold because current demand for craft beer in that country is low.

Rwanda was never intended to be a commercial venture, but rather a humanitarian effort. After all, the Third World deserves a refreshing pint as much as the rest of us!

It seems there are plenty of folks who agree. In order to cover some of the startup costs, Beau's launched a Crowdfunding campaign which closed after 1,138 backers from Canada and around the world tossed \$110,400 into the pot for the Rwanda Craft Brewery Project. Most of the funds will finance the purchase of a bottling line.

If all goes well, Beau's hopes to see the African brewery open by Canada Day, 2018, which coincides with Rwanda's national holiday.

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Beau's is backing future owner Josephine Uwineza, a successful restauranteur in the Rwandan capital city Kigali, who spent several weeks in Canada for hands-on training – and sampling no doubt - at Beau's. Uwineza now feels a special affiliation with Canada.


It all started when she shared a business idea with Toronto consultant Nancy Coldham who has worked in Rwanda mentoring female entrepreneurs. Coldham reached out to the Ontario Craft Brewers Association who connected the women with Beau's which sent a team to Rwanda to assess the project's scope and challenges.

As Beau's Communications Director Jennifer Beauchesne explains, the company doesn't intend to operate the Rwandan plant. It's offering financing, training and expertise and won't take a cut of the profits.

The Vankleek Hill business was looking for a legacy project to celebrate its 10th anniversary, something "in our wheelhouse", as CEO Steve Beauchesne puts it: "We're not well diggers. We're brewers."

Nor does Beau's plan to transfer its Canadian recipes wholesale to Rwanda. The partners hope to incorporate into the mix local staples such as sorghum and bananas. Rwandans have a custom of distilling bananas into homebrew.

Like the Beauchesne's, innovation isn't new to Uwineza. Back in 2000, she established Kigali's first Asian restaurant; between that one and another restaurant, she employed 50 people. Now she wants to open the first brewpub where customers can drink in, or take a six-pack home with them; she expects to employ about a



also stimulate the local agricultural sector.

The Rwandan project has enjoyed a great beginning, Steve says, but is far from done. The momentum must now move forward to the next phase with acquisition of more equipment, including shipping and installing it. Essential hops will need to be imported; eventually, Steve says, the Rwandan climate should work well for growing the crop.

Beau's has sourced some donated equipment from Canadian brewing industry suppliers Newlands Systems Inc. whose chief operating officer has experience brewing in Africa and will work with Beau's brewmaster Matthew O'Hara to develop a recipe for the Rwandan market.

The plan is to use as many ingredients as possible from nearby co-ops providing employment for women who grow and harvest crops. Uwineza says the project will empower those women because it'll create a constant demand.

After the Rwandan genocide of 1994 during which nearly one million citizens were killed, women made up 70 per cent of the population; they demanded rights and were instrumental in repairing the shattered economy. Gender equality has been enshrined in the constitution, as have property rights for women and a requirement that they comprise at least 30 per cent of the nation's parliament.

It goes to show once again that if you want to get something done, give the job to women... even providing men with their favourite beverage.

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Community safety improvement project

CORNWALL/UNITED COUNTIES –A group of 21 local agencies have come together to launch a project that will help ensure the safety of individuals, families and groups of people across Cornwall and the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry who are at high risk of suffering from violent acts.

The Cornwall Stormont Dundas Glengarry (CSDG) Situation Table brings together partners from a variety of sectors including mental health, victim services, social services, as well as school boards, the Children's Aid Society and the police. The goal is to reduce the chances of something bad happening to someone imminently.

Cases will be presented at regular weekly meetings and members of the CSDG Situation Table will take action to reduce the imminent risk of harm in a timely manner, usually within 24 to 48 hours. The Situation Table will remain involved in the case until the level of risk has been reduced. Most situations the Table deals with concern a single individual, a family, or a group of people who are affected by multiple risk factors, including mental health issues, domestic conflict, addictions and homelessness. The CSDG Situation Table will work to mitigate the risks rather than wait for a harmful incident that would require an emergency response, all while protecting the privacy of the people being assisted.

Rapid mobilization Tables such as the CSDG Situation Table make police services part of a stronger safety net, rather than being the entire net themselves. "An early collaborative intervention from the Situation Table will help prevent crimes and improve the safety and well-being of the community and local residents," explained Chantal Prieur, Director of Community Support Services at Counselling and Support Services of SDG, in the recent release.

Flooding – Ottawa River

Continued from the front downstream to the Ottawa River, which is very high, partly because of the heavy rains and partly because the river is one of the few Canadian rivers which flows south, meaning its northwesterly sources are still experiencing spring melting. At the Ottawa River's confluence with the St. Lawrence River near Montreal, the situation is compounded as heavy rains also affected the Great Lakes basin, which empties into the St. Lawrence.

Islands in Montreal, Toronto and Ottawa have been submerged, including Toronto Island (which houses the Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport) and Petrie Island near Orleans. States of Emergency have been declared in Ontario and Quebec.

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In Russell, well-known community leader Connie Johnston organized a flood and drink run to Rockland on Sat., May 6. "We filled two vehicles with drinks and food and took it down to about four sites," she said. "Such devastation – it is unbelievable. They were so appreciative. And once again the people of this village were so amazing. I decided to do it on Friday morning. By Saturday morning, I must have had 20 people participating, some staying up all night to bake. And the three businesses that helped me were amazing: Karine Boucher at Foodland, Winchester Tim Hortons and Ches Woolfrey – owner of Shoppers Drug Mart in Embrun. Ches's wife Wanda sent two huge rough neck containers of all handmade food. We found a dead-end street with houses at the end (almost impassable to get to them) that were working so hard to save their homes. They actually cried when we arrived with the food."

Foodland purchased 85 pre-made bags at \$5 each. The list goes on, and the Lions extend many thanks to the citizens of Russell.

There is one particular Cub Scout who needs special mention, Connor Brennan, a 2nd Russell Cub, who made a lot of amazing baked goods and sold them to raise a total of \$102.15 towards the food drive. His goal was to plan a community service project to help him earn the Cubs Seeonee Award, and he's well on his way. Well done, Connor!

reported water levels at Gatineau and Thurso gauges were 45.18m and 43.69m and were forecasted to continue to increase by another 12 to 14cm, causing significant flooding between Gatineau and Hawkesbury.

SNC said, "Residents are advised to stay away from watercourses where flows are high and where banks might be unstable. Parents are encouraged to explain these dangers to their children." These warnings have been consistently given out by the OPP as well.

The OPP in Rockland also stated police have been receiving complaints from the community of motorized vessels on the Ottawa River causing wakes to overflow the sandbags along the City Clarence-Rockland of shoreline.

"Due to rising waters in the flooded area, the OPP would like to discourage members of the public and residents in using their motorboats or Sea-Doos within the City of Clarence-Rockland, as the larger wakes are causing more damage. The OPP is aware that conditions in the area are changing and will utilize whatever resources are required to best serve those who have been evacuated, and those who have chosen to remain with their homes at this time." The OPP has stated that its primary focus is to ensure the safety to those who are being affected by the flood."

The municipality is asking motorboaters to avoid any areas suffering flooding and asking people who are not directly helping to avoid flood zones, particularly Voisine Rd. and County Rd. 17 in Clarence Rockland. In the Nation Township, County Rd. 9 is under water for the second time this spring. In the Outaouais region, Highway 50 is closed for long stretches and Quebec police are asking the public to stay off that road.

The OPP also ask the public to visit www.nation.on.ca for flood warning updates and to report non urgent changes in water-related conditions, instead of calling 911.

SNC asks the public to also report changes in water-related conditions. soil stress fractures (i.e. cracks in soil), abrupt changes in streambanks, or sudden leaning of trees in

Team Cochrane wins Silver Medal for Canada

LETHBRIDGE, ALTA. – After winning the Ontario and Canadian titles, Russell Curling Club's Team Cochrane has brought home a silver medal for Canada at the recent Senior Men's World Curling Championships April 23 to April 29. Canada's strong play in the extra end saw Sweden's skip Mats Wranaa facing two well-placed Canadian stones, one fully on the 4-foot ring and guarded by one on the 8-foot. With his last shot, Wranaa made a perfect draw to the button for the win, defeating Canada by mere inches to win the gold.

"Representing Canada - and Russell - in the World Championships as the home team was an amazing experience," said skip Bryan Cochrane. The team was cheered on by fans across the country, and especially those in their home club. Cochrane and Sullivan grew up in curling in Russell, with both having parents who were active members of the club. Along with his wife Laurie Clement and their children Erin, Ryan and Jamie, Cochrane's mother Marion, a club member for more than 50 years, travelled to Lethbridge to also cheer for the team. Sullivan's partner Cheryl Stanley was in the stands with Ken's daughters Kirsten and Taylor, and a number of loyal Russell fans were there as well to cheer on the team in person. 
Fentanyl information session in Russell
