Remembering those who served

CORNWALL – There was plenty to celebrate during the annual reunion of the Stormont Dundas and Glengarry Highlanders held May 4, 5 at the Cornwall Armoury during the sesquicentennial year of the Counties own regiment.

Although there has been a military presence in the local area since the coming of the United Empire Loyalists after the conclusion of the American Revolution in 1783, the SDG Highlanders are only able to trace their lineage back to the 59th Stormont-Glengarry Battalion of Infantry which was formed on July 3, 1868.

The Regimental Foundation of the SDG Highlanders

received several gifts during the afternoon event of the reunion. Ethel Barringtan of Coburg donated a painting by Canadian artist Arend Nieuwland entitled Memory of Leesten, which depicted aspects of the liberation of Leesten in Holland during the Second World War in early April 1945. Prior to the unveiling of the painting, Hendrik Dykman, a resident of Leesten during the liberation and friend of the Regiment, provided an in depth account of the event which inspired the artist. A silver tray was donated by Anne Wallner in memory of family members who served during the First and Second World War with the Regiment.

Following the launch of the most recent regimental history written by William Patterson and a presentation on the Friendship Garden project in Cornwall by Cornwall & District Horticultural Society member Thelma Cameron, Bill Smirle of Morewood presented a brief history of the Morewood Cenotaph before a showing of the recently unveiled painting of the Cenotaph by Gordon Coulthart was provided to those present. Shortly thereafter, William Shearing of Morrisburg presented a framed print of the painting to the Regimental Foundation.

The integral relationship between the SDG Highlanders and the communities it has served during time of peace as well as war-time was highlighted during this significant regimental reunion, reflecting its motto "Dileas Gu Bas" translated from the Scottish Gaelic into English as "Faithful Unto Death."



History launched

During the 2018 Glen's Reunion, the third Regimental History of the SDG Highlanders was launched. The first Regimental history was written by Lt.-Col. William Boss following the Second World War, with Gen. (retired) William Patterson writing Up The Glens 1783-1994 and the newest regimental history Up The Glens Stormont Dundas and Glengarry Highlanders 1868-2018 by Patterson. 

Three million and counting

Trees! You can't always tell by the swaths of clear-cutting across eastern Ontario, but they're the most important feature on the landscape.

Forests help filter the air and protect the quality and quantity of drinking water. They offer shade, reduce erosion and greenhouse gases, shelter wildlife, block wind and noise, offer recreational opportunities, and provide valuable forest products including lumber, nuts and maple syrup, as well as Indigenous crafts and medicines.

That's why South Nation Conservation, other conservation authorities across the province, and some other organizations have wellestablished reforestation programs. So when a significant milestone is reached on the treeplanting front as one was recently in our region, it's cause to celebrate. And celebrate they did last Saturday at SNC's Camp Sheldrick south of Winchester by - you guessed it – planting more

It marked the three millionth tree planted under the auspices of SNC since 1990 when a partnership program with private landowners and public organizations was introduced to share the cost and the workload of replenishing depleted forests in the 4,300 extending from north of Brockville and east to Plantagenet area.

Beavering away installing a 1,500-tree windbreak at Camp Sheldrick were at least 100 members of the Scouting movement. Trying to get an accurate count was like trying to herd cats; those Scout sprouts were everywhere. And never get between a herd of Scouts and the hotdog table! I left dogless.

"The Scouting movement has always been a great supporter of tree-planting program," says John Mesman, SNC and communications outreach director. "We've partnered with various

over the years."

A white pine was separated from the batch and planted separately as the official three millionth tree. Later, John says, the tree will be formally signed to recognize its honourary role. Down the road, you'll be able to take your kids and grandkids to Camp Sheldrick and show them the three millionth tree which will grow into a piece of environmental history.

SNC general manager Angela Coleman notes that the tree planting program has been one of SNC's mainstays and largest undertakings involving countless staff and volunteer hours over close to 20 years. I've been involved with SNC during all that time, as a member of Communications Committee, and watched square-km watershed tree planting take on greater importance, awareness and acceptance its inherent for environmental value. Regional residents now line up to take part with the help of SNC staff who recommend appropriate species and planting plans.

> Along with water quality and flood management, wildlife and habitat enhancement, education and awareness, reforestation is one of the cornerstone programs of SNC which in 2017 celebrated its 70th anniversary. Every year, more than 100,000 native trees and shrubs are planted by SNC staff, partners, and private landowners, along stream banks, on vacant land, in

Scout groups many times managed forests, and on properties donated by owners who want to keep them intact.

Perhaps even more important than actually planting trees enhancing education and awareness concerning their value, John observes. Activities such as the Sheldrick Camp celebration provide important opportunities to engage communities and, particularly, youth who are more likely to become conservation-conscious adults.

"Planting trees is, of itself, a great effort. But understanding why we plant them is even more important."

"There are never too many trees," John emphasizes, pointing out that despite ongoing planting efforts, the forest cover threshold across



SNC's jurisdiction, on average, has fallen below 30 the per recommended bу Environmental and Climate Change Canada.

That's largely due to clear-cutting for residential agricultural development. SNC has a stakeholder committee in place investigating potential solutions that will satisfy all concerned, from farmers looking to expand their crop fields, to developers applying to plant more rows of new homes.

"Think about it... three million trees!" Angela observes. "That's a lot of trees and a lot of dedication and effort, a goal only realized thanks to buy-in from the community at large. Next stop: our four millionth tree!"

While it may seem like a lot of trees - and it is other agencies are racking up impressive numbers as well. For example, neighbouring Rideau Valley Conservation Authority has planted 5.7million trees since 1983.

So get out there and get planting! We need to close the gap between we residents of SNC jurisdiction and that treehappy gang over in Rideau Valley!



Her door was always open to neighbours and strangers alike - she would help anyone in need. Everyone loved her.

There was a lot of hard work in her life, but there was also so much joy! That's when she pulled out all the stops - with table upon table laden with every possible treat her family might enjoy, with decorations everywhere, and Christmas lights. "Let me check the date," she would say. "I have it in my bible." And she collected newspaper clippings of her family's accomplishments, most recently of Kurtis' golfing career.

Bertha bowled, she drove tractors and rode bicycles, but she never learned to drive a car. Bertha loved to go dancing at the Legion, and played darts and cards - Euchre was her favorite - and she was fiercely competitive at it! You did not get in the way of that woman and her Euchre game. She loved to go ng, and she loved to fish – but, taking the fish off the line, not so m She loved bingo, and she loved to race around the aisles at Walmart with the carts that you can sit behind.

She raised her own seven children, she raised four of her long-time partner Pete's children, she raised her very young sister-in-law, and she cared for her beloved father-in-law later in life.

We will remember Bertha's kind and welcoming heart, her selflessness in always putting others first, her cheerfulness - waking up each morning giving thanks for the blessing of another day. She appreciated everyone and everything just as they were - without judgment or expectation. She truly was the mother, the friend, everyone would want to have.

Bertha was an amazing woman. She will be sorely missed, and remembered

always, with the deepest of love and admiration. The painting was commissioned by the Chesterville & District Historical Society, financed by donations from private individuals and organizations and donated to the Morewood Cenotaph Committee. The cenotaph was dedicated on July 6, 1921 and since that time has been the focal point of Remembrance Day commemorations in the community.

Coulthart explained his connection to community and how he considered it quite an honour to be selected to paint the painting. Entitled A Fallen Leaf, Coulthart skillfully reproduced the carved statue of Capt. Ernest Glasgow which sits atop four granite bases, placing a single red maple leaf almost at the spot where the statue and base met. Coulthart explained in an email to the Chesterville Record, how the leaf is symbolic of those fallen in battle and the honour we must show to them.

Kim McInnis, secretary of the CDHS, was reached for comment and is quoted as saying how this project "underscores our dedication

to the preservation of local history and gave us the opportunity to have a more interactive relationship with the community." She went on to say how "The painting itself portrays a series of emotions, encapsulating sadness and pride while capturing the spirit of days gone by."

SDSG MP Guy Lauzon mentioning how this project "is another step ensuring that the 22 soldiers from the Morewood area who gave up their lives to protect our freedoms during Canada's major conflicts will not be forgotten."






