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
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Chesterville Farmers' Market looks forward to opening day

CHESTERVILLE — After long-time organizer of the Chesterville Farmers' Market Cheryl Beasley announced she would be stepping down, the fate of the market was unknown. However, in January a meeting was held for those interested in the Farmers' Market in hopes of finding area locals willing to keep the tradition going.

Luckily for Chesterville, five community members have stepped up to work together in organizing the future of the market. Monique Morris, William Stephenson, Daniel Riitano, Brian Talmey and Thomas Schoch will be the minds behind the coming season.

Set to open on May 18, Morris said that the committee hopes to have a grand opening, decked out with all the bells and whistles, to re-introduce the market to the locals. At the top of the to-do list, is bringing in vendors offering fresh produce and meat.

"I feel like what was missing, through feedback and what I've heard, is the fresh produce and meats," said Morris. "I personally have read most of everything in the



threads and I've heard about the lack of local produce and the lack of local meats. That really and truly is where our efforts are going to be focused on."

Morris said there are about nine available spots on the upper portion of Main Street with the opportunity for more vendors along the waterfront. While Morris admits that the committee has a challenge ahead of them in rebuilding, there has already been some excitement from local businesses.

"We are all pretty devoted," said Morris of the

committee, "and between all of us we can get these vendors who want to be there."

Vendors are being offered one-day, half season and full season booth options in the hopes that flexibility will help some of the less available vendors. In addition, the committee is brainstorming sponsorship options and other ways to give back to the community.

The season, which runs until Oct. 19, will see markets every Saturday from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. with the potential for "special markets" at other times of the year.

Until the opening day, the committee will be busy scheduling the events for the grand opening and working to get vendors. Morris said that she hopes the community will be reinvigorated with a fresh take on the local market on the horizon.

"We have heard and read and are addressing the concerns that the locals have. When you think of a farmers' market you think of bounty and produce and fresh and local, and that is 100 per cent the committee's vision as well. We want to bring back what the people are looking and hoping for," she concluded.

Humanity takes a big step back

It's often the butt of many dark-humoured jokes that people are sort of self-aware about how "evil" and "selfish" humans can be.

However, there are always those optimists out there who can still walk around and proclaim that people are inherently good natured and kind-hearted. Unfortunately, Feb. 14, a day meant to represent love and compassion, will not be a day looked back on with fondness.

At approximately 11:30 p.m., Peel Regional Police sent out an Amber alert to alert nearby residents that 11-yearold Riya Rajkumar was abducted by her father Roopesh and currently on the run. While Amber alerts are usually meant to rally the community and any nearby locals in order to locate missing children, this one did the opposite.

Due to the late time the alert was sent, many were awakened from their sleep and called 911 to complain about being awakened in the middle of the night, instead of keeping the lines open for people who could potentially have information on Riya's location. Between the time the alert was sent out and 9 a.m. the next morning, Peel Police received a total of 383 complaint calls about the alert.

However, it sadly doesn't stop there; many more people went to social media to express their displeasure on receiving the alert at such a late time.

Sadly, this story does not have a happy ending. Riya Rajkumar was found dead in the basement of an apartment in Brampton, with her father now in custody and being charged with first-degree murder.

It'd be easy to turn this into an editorial about mental health, talk to someone and try to see the warning signs in everyone, but it's hard to do that when there is such selfishness in our communities.

So, if you're one of the many people who voiced their anger over receiving this alert, wasting dispatchers' time and line availability; open a new tab and google "Riya Rajkumar", think about how terrified and confused that little girl must've felt during her final hours of life.

Man in Black

When I first walked into the main hall at the Russell Legion Saturday night, I was skeptical; a music lover and Johnny Cash fan (who isn't?), I took a look at the skimpy setup at the front of the hall and had my doubts.

There was no stage. There were a couple of acoustic guitars, an electric guitar, a bass and a drum kit arranged along the wall, some stand-up mics, a few basic amplifiers and not much else. How were these guys going to do justice to the beloved, the powerful Johnny Cash sound?

I was there with about 160 others – a full house in other words - for "Ring of Fire - A Johnny Cash Experience" which bills itself as Canada's most critically acclaimed Cash tribute band. After the four young performers under 30 years of age interpreting the Man in Black and his backup band the Tennessee Three stepped behind their instruments, it didn't take long to understand the band wasn't exaggerating its ability.

I made a last-minute decision to attend when there were only a handful of tickets available. I didn't Google it or anything. It turns out the period of Cash's legendary career being recreated was

the 1950s through 70s when the real-life sparse set-up would have looked a lot like the presentation at the Legion. Cash and the three, dressed in suit and tie just as frontman Andy Vickers and his bandmates did on Saturday night, claiming to represent the "Golden Age of Show Business."

And the sound! So crisp, clear and authentic! I literally did a double-take at the Folsom Prison Blues' instantly recognizable, opening guitar riff, the kick-off tune. Start big or go home, I always say! Not only does Vickers look a lot like the young Cash but he has the pipes and the mannerisms to pull it off, even when he says the famous opener: "Hello... I'm Johnny Cash!"

He's backed by Joey DePaiva on bass, Dave Johnson on drums and Dave Pearson on lead guitar providing the unmistakable trademark sound. Over a two-hour show with 20-minute intermission, the band flawlessly took us through more than 30 Cash tunes, some of which I have to admit I didn't know. Most of them were greeted excitedly by the crowd.

I highly recommend an evening with these proud Canadians helping to carry on the Cash legacy. It was probably the best \$20 I ever spent and I'll happily another spend whenever I can get to another performance.

After talking to a couple of Legion execs, the way I understand arrangement is that Ring of Fire takes the gate and the Legion takes proceeds from the bar and, in this case, sales of pizza slices at \$3 each. The Legion didn't have to front any cash (pardon the pun!) to bring in the show... so a good financial night was had by all.

One of the very interesting things about this presentation that has travelled the country from one end to the other several times playing mainly smaller venues is its commitment to the Royal Canadian Legion and what it stands for. Suddenly the rollicking concert took a serious turn... the band was on a mission.

Unfortunately, Vickers, a proud Legion member along with the other players and their manager Julie Filion, didn't get the full attention of the Russell crowd when he poignantly tried to explain that commitment; yes, you could argue that attention is never available in what amounts to a bar... but he certainly deserved the courtesy.



The message he tried to convey over the din was that Ring of Fire has set aside its available dates to exclusively perform at Legion branches from Victoria to St. John's, encouraging audience members who haven't, to sign up with their local Legion in order to help the movement carry on during increasingly trying

Since 2006, Vickers stated, 64 branches have closed their doors forever, removing from veterans some of the tremendous support that they relied upon. According to the tribute artist, the main cause is lack of new membership, reminding those who were actually listening that we often take our treasures for granted until it's too late.

"When we lose a veteran or a Legion member passes, it's up to the younger generations to step in and continue carrying the torch or the number of Legion members will keep dwindling down and these sacred buildings will only be a memory."

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Ontario is on the right track to fiscal health

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
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Rockets, Eagles battle for home ice





Health Canada recommends that children and youth not use cough and cold products that contain opioids

OTTAWA - The Government of Canada is committed to better informing Canadians about the risks of health products that contain opioids. Following a safety review of cough and cold products containing opioids, Health Canada is advising that Canadian children and adolescents (under 18 years of age) should not use cough and cold products containing codeine, hydrocodone and normethadone, as a precautionary measure.

Health Canada's safety review found that there is limited evidence to support the effectiveness of these products in children and adolescents (under 18 years of age). In addition, while the review did not find any strong evidence linking cough and cold products that contain opioids with opioid use disorders in children and adolescents, it did find that the early use of opioids may be a factor in problematic substance use later in life. Given the lack of strong data on effectiveness and the potential for longer-term risks, the Department is taking action to advise Canadians about the risks of these products.

to update their product safety information to reflect the Department's recommendation that children and adolescents (under 18 years of age) not use these products.

Three prescription opioids are authorized to treat cough symptoms in Canada: codeine, hydrocodone, and normethadone. Codeine is also available without a prescription in lowdose formulations to treat cough and cold.

Information for parents and caregivers:

Ask your healthcare professional about alternatives to cough and cold products containing opioids for your children or adolescents. Always read the labels on your medications and any safety information provided by your pharmacist or other healthcare professional.

In Canada, the use of prescription cough and cold products containing opioids has been declining among children and adolescents over the past five years. The current use of these products by children and adolescents represents a small proportion (4%) of the total opioid cough and cold prescriptions dispensed in Canada.

Health Canada plans to consult with the Health Canada is also asking manufacturers Drug Safety and Effectiveness Network to study the links between opioid use disorder and related harms and the use of products that contain opioids in Canada. Health Canada will continue to monitor harms involving all products that contain opioids. The department has also requested that manufacturers of prescription opioid products submit risk management plans to track and monitor risks in the Canadian population.

Given the availability of other non-

prescription products containing low-dose codeine and their potential to lead to problematic use, Health Canada has initiated a review of all non-prescription products for children and adolescents that contain codeine to determine whether similar action is appropriate.

Once Health Canada has made a decision based on the available evidence, it will take action, as required, to inform Canadians and healthcare professionals.

- The Carlsbad Springs Community Association has received details on yet another proposed major industrial development south of Highway 417 along Boundary Road.

The City of Ottawa, the association has indicated, has received a site plan application for a single storey 53,712 square-ft. warehouse with 62 loading bays and 52 parking spaces at the corner of Mitch remains unchallenged, with Owens and Boundary Roads not far from the new

Amazon distribution facility and almost diagonally across from the Capital Region Resources Recovery Centre.

Another industrial project

With its promise of 600 jobs, the well-received Amazon project is rushing towards completion. Although approved, the Taggart Miller Recovery Centre which includes a high-capacity landfill remains controversial with more hurdles to jump.

In between those two, the to-date low profile proposed transportation terminal for decision on the application from the city's Planning, Infrastructure and Economic Development Department.

The combined area of the vacant lot is a little over 10 acres with close to 500 feet of frontage on Mitch Owens and about 827 feet of frontage along Boundary. The property retains some tree cover along both roads, with a narrow dirt road crossing it; council passed a road closure application last December to accommodate the project.

Surrounding uses include a target date of March 12 set vacant land, agricultural land, and various industrial

uses such as automotive repair and recycling, heavy equipment storage and landscaping contractors. A few detached dwellings are also located in the area.

According to the site plan, two property access points will be created; one on Mitch Owens and one on Boundary. Of the 52 parking spaces, 12 would be reserved for employees. If approved, the warehouse compound is to be fenced with sliding gate access for truck entry. Roadway modifications are proposed to facilitate truck movement in and out of the site.

The new facility would serve primarily as a transfer station with large trucks bringing merchandise in, and smaller trucks moving it around the city.
