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

Welcome to your new home!

AVONMORE - Three years of waiting and working came to fruition when the Almunif family were welcomed at Ottawa International Airport by members of the sponsorship group on Nov. 7. The family of seven are starting the process of settling into their new home in Avonmore, with the older children attending local schools and parents enrolled in Newcomers' English classes at the TR Leger School in Cornwall.

Jan Wright, a spokesperson for the North Stormont Refugee Support Coalition, described in a recent email to *The Chesterville Record*, the process whereby the family was able to make the long trip from Beirut, Lebanon to the Avonmore area.

Wright explained the NSRSC has been meeting for several years to ensure everything needed for the refugee family would be in place when they arrived to begin their new life in Canada; this included a place to live, items needed for everyday living and of course, the money

South Dundas council meets

MORRISBURG - South Dundas council members were quite busy during the Nov. 18 meeting held at the municipal building in Morrisburg. In addition to the more routine matters and reports to be considered, two presentations were made to council for financial funding.

President and CEO of Winchester District Memorial Hospital and Dundas Manor Long-Term Care Home Holly Boland, and Bill Smirle, chair of the Dundas Manor board, made a presentation to council outlining the history of the Dundas Manor Long-Term Care Home, its role in the local community and plans to build a new building to increase the level of senior care.

Dundas Manor opened its doors in 1978

with 60 beds growing to its current 98 bed size in the 1990s, with no increase in support service areas as it grew in size. During the presentation it was disclosed that Dundas Manor received a "C" designation due to its inefficient and ineffective design, with plans to replace the current aging structure with a new building by 2025. Smirle explained in the new 128 bed building, there would be a maximum of two residents per room and described the residents of Dundas Manor as the builders of our local communities.

The cost of the new two-storey 128 bed building was estimated to be over \$30-million dollars with the government providing two-thirds of that amount, with the remaining one-third or \$10-11 million dollars to be raised locally. South Dundas

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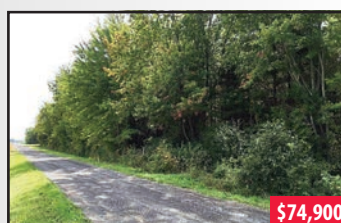


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Cold weather, warm hearts

NORTH DUNDAS – For several years the North Dundas Christmas Fund has worked with community organizations and individuals to ensure the younger citizens of our municipality have warm clothes for the cold winter months.

Recently, chair of the North Dundas Christmas

Fund, Bob Weagant sent out a letter seeking financial support for the 2019 fundraising drive. Weagant explained how the NDCF partners with local organizations such as area Lions Clubs, schools, churches, local branches of the Royal Canadian Legion and individuals to raise money to purchase snowsuits for children, pyjamas and food baskets for those in need.

In 2019 the NDCF “gave out over 163 new snowsuits to children 13 and under” as well as “154 pairs of children’s pyjamas were also distributed” with “204 food baskets in 2018 to families in need in our

area.” He continued how “food drives are organized through the schools and churches” with financial support provided by Scotiabank, service clubs, businesses and “your private donations.”

Weagant suggested contacting 613-989-3830 or 613-774-0188 to have a snowsuit or Christmas food basket provided to someone who needs a helping hand this holiday season and for those wishing to make a donation, it was suggested to “make your cheque payable to the North Dundas Christmas Fund” before mailing it to “Box 27, South Mountain Ontario K0E 1W0.”

CN Rail and Teamsters reach tentative agreement

ONTARIO – After a weeklong strike, Teamsters Canada and Canadian National (CN) Railway have finally reached a tentative deal on Tues., Nov. 26. Among the many impacts of the rail strike, it halted propane shipments, threatening supply for both Ontario and Quebec and slowing down farmers’ already delayed harvest.

This new agreement will renew contracts for 3,200 conductors, trainpersons and yard workers and normal operations at CN will resume tomorrow at 6 a.m. local time across Canada.

“I am pleased to announce that we’ve reached a tentative agreement with CN. I would like to thank our members for their incredible courage and solidarity,” said the president of Teamsters Canada, François Laporte in an official statement from Teamsters Canada’s website. “I would also like to thank all the Teamster local unions from across different industries, all the labour organizations and members of the public who supported us on the picket line.”

Details of this new agreement will not be released until members have had a chance to review the details first and there will be no job action during the ratification period. These results are expected within the next eight weeks.

“We want to thank our customers for their patience and support and assure them that CN is preparing to resume full rail operations as soon as possible,” said JJ Ruest, president and chief executive officer of CN in an official statement. “I would also like to personally thank our employees who kept the railroad moving safely at a reduced capacity. CN and its people are committed to moving the North American economy by providing freight service that enables economic growth.”

The CN strike began on Tues., Nov. 19 because, according to the union, the work environment was unsafe, and they had been in negotiations for months. The workers were demanding improvements to workplace health and safety after nine workers reportedly died in railway related incidents over the past two years.

As a result of this strike, Quebec had put up a propane notice for supply emergency, stating that it would only be days before running out; and Ontario was not far behind. Farmers were in danger of losing acres of crops without proper drying capabilities.

Stormont, Dundas and South Glengarry MP Eric Duncan, who had previously called for the House of Commons to reconvene immediately to address the situation, was very happy with the news. “Glad to hear,” he wrote in a tweet. “Let’s get those rail cars with propane moving again & let our farmers finish the harvest.”

required by the Canadian government for sponsorship groups “to be used to support the family during their first year in Canada.” Once the money had been raised, the organization made the application, which included “a very large amount of very complicated paperwork,” for the Almunif family to come to Canada. An interview with the Almunif family was conducted at the Canadian Embassy in Beirut followed by medical and security checks once the application from the NSRSC had been accepted.

While travel arrangements were being made for the family, the organization was busy with planning for the family’s arrival in Canada. A house was rented and furnished for the Almunif family in Avonmore and earlier this year the long flight from Beirut Lebanon, via Cairo Egypt to Toronto where “they were processed through Customs and Immigration” before flying to Ottawa “where the sponsorship group met them at the airport.”

Wright concluded her email by commenting how “the Almunifs are overjoyed to be here and overwhelmed by the support of the community – people they have never met – who are welcoming and helping them.”

Navigating legal rights

FINCH – Tensions between the North Stormont public and EDPR continue to grow since construction began on the Nation Rise project earlier this year. On Wed., Nov. 20, OPP Sgt. Matt Eamer and concerned citizen Ruby Mekker led a Public Information Session to outline the legal rights of citizens.

“Our main concern is public safety,” said Eamer to the crowd of approximately 20 attendees. “We’re here to prevent offences from being committed, protecting property and protecting life.”

The point of the meeting was to lay out the rights and freedoms of the residents who continue to share their displeasure over the project. Eamer made it clear to the group that, under the charter of rights and freedoms, people can always gather to assert their rights in a peaceful manner.

“That’s something we strive to protect,” he said. “Just like someone taking part in a lawful labour picket, that’s their lawful right to do that.”

He also stressed that under the criminal code, there are some limits in place to ensure everyone’s safety during protests. For one, locals are asked to not obstruct the roadways or to breach the peace.

“You can’t participate in a riot or cause a disturbance,” said Eamer.

“If you look in the criminal code, disturbance constitutes swearing, yelling, profanity or anything like that. Anything that would cause the average person to be disturbed.”

It was also mentioned that you cannot disguise an offence. And, probably the most obvious, residents are prohibited from causing bodily harm to any of the workers or threatening with a weapon.

“It’s really all common sense stuff,” said Eamer. “Although, sometimes people think it’s a good idea to bring different things to a gathering like that.”

Residents also took the opportunity to make their voices heard about their displeasure on the Nation Rise Wind Project.

Right off the bat, the topic of fire suppression came to light.

“We would like fire suppression systems put in these huge turbines/monstrosities that have never been tested, ever in Ontario; let alone Canada,” said Mekker. “We find it hard to understand why the council isn’t all over this.”

“[North Stormont Mayor] Jim Wert did call a gentleman named Stuart Holiday, who is in charge of a multi-municipality group and they insisted that fire suppression be put in their turbines,” she said. “A point they made retroactive for four years,

with a company fine of \$100,000 for any turbine that didn’t have fire suppression.”

Mekker and her group are continuing to tell council that, for the safety of the people, the turbines are too close to homes and if there is ever a turbine failure mixed with surrounding dry grass and corn; it’s a danger waiting to happen.

Another concern that was brought up was the access roads and the lack of stop signs incorporated into oncoming traffic.

“I’ve almost been run off the road twice now,” said one concerned citizen.

Eamer stated that, while there is no stop sign, traffic coming out of the access roads are still required to yield to oncoming traffic.

“It’s not enforced by us because it is not a municipally-placed stop sign,” he said.

There were also concerns of harassment, both online and offline, happening to the concerned citizens who spoke against the project.

One concerned citizen mentioned being harassed



heavily online after authorities in these Crysler Community Centre. Mekker made a point to mention this to anyone who wanted to sit and ask as many questions as needed.

was asked to provide five hundred thousand dollars in funding for the construction of the new Dundas Manor, with Mayor Steven Byvelts mentioning the request will be considered during the upcoming 2020 budget deliberations. Around the council table there was agreement that something needed to be done to improve the quality of living for the residents.

Beyond 21 is an organization that provides adults with developmental disabilities the chance to participate in social, educational and recreational activities after they complete their schooling at age 21. A presentation to South Dundas by the Beyond 21

Foundation requested funding of any amount for the development of a centre on Pitt Street in Cornwall. This centre will continue the work previously done at the Cumberland Street site by providing an accessible and safe area for community connections, participation in home skill development programs and leisure activities such as bowling, martial arts, etc. Byvelts told the presenters the request would be considered at the upcoming budget deliberations.

Following the conclusion of the two presentations, council began the business portion of the meeting which included renewing the agreement with the Morrisburg and District Lions Club to operate the Docksyde canteen at the waterfront for two more years. Ethan Robert was appointed as the deputy-clerk in South Dundas and committee reports were presented to council.

The 56-year old resident of South Glengarry faces charges of Sexual Assault on a person under 16 year of age and sexual interference. The accused was released and is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Alexandria court on Feb. 5, 2020.

F-bombing

The delight about taking in a live show with professional homeboy comic Matt Watson in Russell Township is that his mother Sue will be in the room. More than that: She'll own the room while husband Jim tries to make himself comparatively invisible.

Sue is the perfect foil for her son who, as standup funnyman tend to do, uses the f-bomb as punctuation in routines. Actually, I got the impression that Matt pulled back on the fs during his benefit appearance at Étienne Brûlé pub in Embrun last Wednesday, which sold out in a week, perhaps partly out of deference to his mom.

But he still drove her out the door with one of his cracks... long enough to form a snowball, come back in, and lob it at him in mid-routine. All he had to do to get a large laugh right off the bat is mention that Sue was in the house; everybody there appreciated the clash – at least on the surface – between the prim mom and the irreverent comic son.

Packed to the rafters, the pub with a little furniture re-arranging turned out to

be perfect for the event, pulled together by none other than Sue Watson who was contacted by a group at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic High School arranging a student mission to Guatemala looking for financial help. She booked Matt who brought along a couple of pals from the comedy circuit – Wafik Nasralla and Tim Riel - and the show raised \$450.

Matt started into comedy at least five years ago and I've seen him perform as a rank amateur, as a developing professional and now as a polished pro casually leaning on the mic stand and delivering the lines, many of them specifically aimed at people in the room almost all of whom he knew personally from his days attending St. Thomas, mass at Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal Church with the Watson clan, where his mother was the unofficial morality arbiter, and working various part-time jobs.

Sue managed to squeeze me into EB last-minute in standing room which turned out to be at the bar, so I had no complaints as I sampled the brewpub's latest offerings. Knowing I was in the room, Matt tossed a couple of gentle

lines – actually kind comments – my way as I observed how far he has come in his chosen line of work.

Although his parents said he was nervous performing in front of the hometown crowd, it didn't show with Matt delivering great spontaneous material and some good set pieces with effective pregnant pauses and mystified looks. Sidekicks Wafik and Tim were also raunchily funny, unencumbered as their moms weren't in the audience.

For me, the biggest shock of the night didn't come from the stage; it came from the holding area as I chatted with Wafik and Tim. At first we couldn't believe our ears but we were sure we heard Sue drop the f-bomb, possibly to fit in a little better; however, she denied uttering the word leaving myself and the comics thinking we'd developed sudden hearing problems in unison.

On Sunday, I got a text from Sue while on her way to mass telling me she could no longer live with the lie: "As I was examining my conscience this morning, I thought I should confess to you that I did in fact say the f-word.



Out of respect to you and myself, I felt you needed to know this as the media needs to print the facts. You have been so thoughtful with the Watsons that I, in fact, personally owe you that apology. It was my intention to make the comedians feel comfortable as I give them many restrictions prior to the show. Blessings my dear Tom."

OK! Have I been punked? Who actually wrote this? Matt... are you working on new material about your mom? Sue... are you helping your son with the routine? If it's genuine, of course I accept your apology for not wanting to admit to using the f-word because you didn't want me to write about it... which I just did! As your penance, say three Hail Marys, two Our Fathers... and stay away from comedy clubs unless your son is performing; even then, it isn't advised.

WINCHESTER – A magical adventure befalls Aladdin when he begins to believe that there is more to life than washing dirty socks in the Twankey laundry facility. With the help of a big-headed Genie of the Lamp and a Ring Genie, Jennie – who happens to think she works in a call centre – Aladdin takes on evil Abanazar. This gender-bending fairy tale breaks the fourth wall, erupts with spontaneous song and dance, and constantly surprises with its over-the-top characters.

An extensive and eclectic all-star cast, including deputy-mayor, Al Armstrong, two local doctors, and a gang of lovable dancers, pay tribute to Aladdin, the classic folk tale of Middle Eastern origin. 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Boil Water Advisory for the Newington Drinking Water System

NEWINGTON – The Township of South Stormont will be undertaking upgrades to the Newington Water Treatment Plant. On Tues., Nov. 26, the pressure tanks were brought off line which may result in low water pressure within the water distribution system. This may happen over several short durations of time up until Thurs., Nov. 28. The Township of South Stormont, as the owner of the drinking water system, is advising all people on the Newington Drinking Water System to boil their

tap water before drinking it because of the potential for low water pressure in the drinking water system serving the area. The Boil Water Advisory is in effect until further notice.

To avoid possible illness, you must bring the water to a rolling boil for

at least one minute before drinking it. Let the water cool down before using or drinking. Boiling the water will kill any harmful microorganisms in the water.

Until further notice, use boiled water or an alternate source of safe

drinking water (such as bottled water) for: drinking; making ice cubes, juices or other mixes; preparing baby food or infant formula; preparing food, including washing fruits and vegetables; gargling or brushing teeth or dentures.

Affected households have been notified by door-to-door notices, for more information on how the Boil Water Advisory will impact daily activities including bathing and hand washing, visit the township's Facebook page or website.

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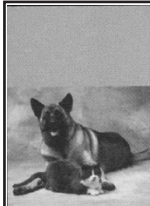
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MP Duncan announces local office staffing and details

All of the constituency staff that worked for previous MP Guy Lauzon have joined Duncan's office. Adrian Bugelli will continue as executive assistant between the Parliament Hill and Cornwall offices, while Denise Jalbert, Sue Dingwall, Nicole Lefebvre and Francine Lepage will work as constituency assistants on case files.

"I am very lucky to have the entire team agree to stay on in their roles with our office," said MP Duncan. "Constituents have got to know them very well and know that they offer excellent customer service on federal case files. Whether it is a passport application, or an issue with Canada Revenue Agency or CPP, we will be there to help."

The new full-time constituency office will remain in Cornwall, but the location has moved to 691 Brookdale Avenue (just

south of the traffic circle and St. Hubert's) in the International Business Plaza. Full operations have started effective this week and the office hours will remain the same with service available Monday to Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

"We are excited to move into our new office space on Brookdale Avenue. The parking is ideal, office space is more private, it is located along a bus route, and it is very easy to find for anyone living outside the City of Cornwall," continued Duncan.

Duncan announced that the customer service programs started by his

predecessor Lauzon will come. Satellite office hours will remain every Monday in Winchester (8:30 a.m. to noon at the Township of North Dundas Office in Winchester) and Morrisburg (1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.). The Volunteer Income Tax Clinic will be operating over the winter and Passport Clinics will be held annually in various parts of the riding.

Contact information for the offices will remain the same as MP Lauzon's as well. The main numbers for the constituency office remains 613-937-3331 and toll-free at 1-888-805-2513. The email address is Eric.Duncan@parl.gc.ca.

Ottawa commuter service comes to South Stormont

INGLESIDE – Since the beginning of November, Evans Bus Lines, located in Newington, has been offering South Stormont commuters with the opportunity to travel between Ingleside and Ottawa.

In a recent email to *The Chesterville Record*, Kathleen Anderson explained RT 450, which ran between Morrisburg and Ottawa with stops along County Road 43, has been extended to include a stop in Ingleside to accommodate South Stormont commuters. Anderson added that a business plan, expressions of support from South Stormont residents and businesses as well as the Municipality of South Stormont were included in a proposal to the Highway Transportation Board along with a fee payment to the HTB; which then reviewed "the need for the service" and mediated with operators who might disagree with the proposal before final approval was given.

The commuter service on RT 450 is available on both a monthly and occasional basis, but Anderson recommends that if you are looking for a one-way trip on the commuter bus, to call the office to ensure there is a seat available on the date required. Information on fares and stops is also available on the bus company's website.

The 38-44 passenger bus is a "sleek back executive level

mini coach bus" with leather seats, air conditioning and "outlets to plug in so you can work while on the road," according to information from Anderson.

For 30 years Evans Bus Lines has provided transportation service to the local community with school buses and in 2014 began the RT 450 commuter service. Anderson explained this was "one of the last adventures my father Rory Evans started as he passed away in the summer of 2014." She continued how "with running a family-based business we understand the need for others in difficult times and have been working hard at finding a way to help seniors and people of all ages to have another reliable source of transportation for shopping, doctors and specialist appointments."

Anderson continued how in addition to bus charter work, school bus transportation and commuter service to Ottawa, Evan's Bus Lines is holding "an event called GLOW which is in Ottawa on December 15", with more information available on the company's Facebook page.

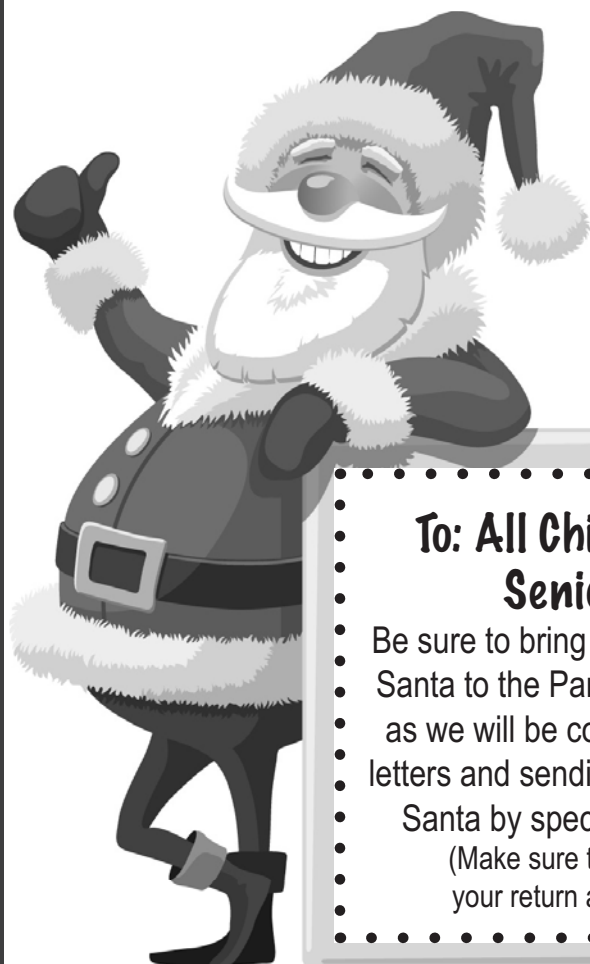

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Robert Kirby honoured at the 2019 UCPR Warden's Banquet

As is also tradition, the Warden's Award is presented during the Banquet to recognize the dedicated work, outstanding contribution and professionalism of a municipal employee toward the community and their colleagues. This year, Warden Kirby chose to recognize Mélissa Cadieux, clerk for the UCPR since 2018 and very recently appointed as the supervisor of Provincial Offences. Since her arrival, several important new procedures and policies have been implemented within the corporation, including the use of electronic signatures as well as an advanced records management system.

Beautification project pushes ahead in Russell

RUSSELL – For the past few years, the Kin Club of Russell has been pushing for the installation of two new identification signs for the Village of Russell, much like in Embrun a few years back.

After years of planning, the Russell Township council officially approved the project for the new signs. "Another wonderful project of volunteers coming together to beautify and make our community a better place," said Russell Township Mayor Pierre Leroux.

These signs would be located at the

East end of the village, at Castor Street and the Fitness Trail and the West end, at the west of 303 Craig Street.

The plan for these signs is to have one Russell sign on two brick pillars and the other Russell sign would be on a brick base. The sign would be made of aluminum and illuminated by solar lights, evergreens would be used as background with perennials in front.

The Kin Club of Russell, according to Leroux, has been fundraising approximately for the past six months, but would like some contribution from the township for lighting and legal costs, much like the project in Embrun

previously. The amount required by the club and proposed on the 2020 budget was \$24,000.

This amount was approved verbally from all parties involved including the United Counties of Prescott and Russell, the Russell Township Infrastructure Department and Reynald Patenaude, a property owner whose land will have to accommodate one of the signs due to the road allowance not being wide enough.

The total estimated cost of the project, including land easement, signage, construction costs and professional fees, is \$94,650.
