EDPR halts construction on Nation Rise after approval revoked

NORTH STORMONT - Ontario's Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks has revoked approval for the decision based on my conclusion that the Nation Rise wind turbine project under construction in North Stormont. The move has some local residents celebrating but since construction was well underway, many questions remain about the fate of the project.

In a Dec. 4 letter to Margaret Benke, a founder of the group, Concerned Citizens of North Stormont, Minister Jeff Yurek says he has revoked approval for the wind turbines due to the threat they pose to the local bat

Benke had appealed the Environmental Review Tribunal's January 2019 decision. Minister Yurek said, explaining his decision, "I am therefore altering the Tribunal's project will cause serious and irreversible harm to bats and I revoke the approval."

Since the minister's decision, EDP Renewables Canada Ltd. has halted all construction activities on the Nation Rise project.

In a statement, the company said it "strongly objects" to the Ontario government's recent decision to revoke the Renewable Energy Approval for Nation Rise and is "assessing all potential legal actions."



The 100-megawatt Nation Rise wind energy project was to include 29 wind turbines. Nation Rise began construction in May. Construction is quite advanced with numerous wind turbines already fully erected.

"This unprecedented decision means the REA that was issued by the minister's own staff, defended by ministry legal counsel and subsequently ratified by the Environmental Review Tribunal is no longer in effect," says EDPR's statement.

Minister Yurek explains that his decision was taken on the basis that the turbine project would cause "localized harm to an already small bat population." The bats in question include colonies of big brown bats, hoary bats and little brown bats, the latter of which, brown bats are on the Species at Risk Ontario

The minister has also closed the door on the possibility of a "remedy hearing," where the parties involved could submit

information to determine the appropriate "remedy," which could include amending the terms of the renewable energy approval, revoking approval or directing specific actions. "In this case, I don't believe that a third round of submissions is necessary ... in light of the public interest reasons for revocation..."

The minister noted that this project's output is only a small fraction of Ontario's energy usage.

EDPR, for its part, is prepared to pursue legal action, so there is unlikely to be any quick resolution for local landowners who have leased land to the project or others who have agreements in place with the company.

EDPR says the Nation Rise facility had created more than 230 local construction jobs to date and would create about 10 permanent local jobs during operation. Also, according to the company, the project would have injected more than \$45-million over 30 years into the local community through municipal taxes, a community benefit fund, charitable contributions and landowner payments.



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Species at risk shuts down Nation Rise

The Nation Rise Wind Turbine project has been halted due to a species of bats which are at risk of extinction. The Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks revoked EDP Renewables Canada Ltd.'s approval of the project according to a press release on Mon., Dec. 9, by Minister Jeff Yurek. The bats in question include colonies of big brown bats, hoary bats and little brown bats. The little brown bats are on the Species at Risk in Ontario list. Moore photo


At ECPS, students played mini sticks and did obstacle courses, cup stacking, board games, Dance Revolution, beyblades and building with Lego.

Re: North Stormont under Siege

Councillor Douglas' letter to the editor in The Chesterville Record on Dec. 11 might be better titled "Under siege from within."

In his letter, Mr. Douglas laments on the "lack of decorum" and calls on residents to rally and defeat those "unrelenting, multi-faceted, personal, rude, negative and toxic folks" attempting to advance their own agendas.

It is public knowledge that legal bills are piling up within North Stormont. As is now reported on NorthStormontWatchdog.com, there are a number of issues within our municipality. That said, we appreciate that councillor Villeneuve has been valiantly supporting the best interests of all residents even against the siege from within.

We have been contacted by quite a number of people who feel that we are the obvious focus of his wrath as councillor Douglas twice mentioned the Nation Rise project and we have been the most visible at council. If that is the case, it's only fair to present "the other side."

The fire chief has done his homework on fire suppression. He too has talked with others and understands the legal requirement to protect life first and foremost. We believe his life-safety recommendation should be respected and that he should not be harassed or pressured by council members or the CAO because of it.

We have been before the ministers of energy and environment at Queens Park in Toronto. We have consulted with our MP and MPP and are on their riding executives. We have spoken to Doug Ford and his staff. We met repeatedly with the Ministry of the Environment (MECP) staff from Cornwall and their technical staff in Kingston, all on our own nickel.

Ruby has provided factual information to the previous and present councils. Rainer has been before council for most of 2019 asking for due diligence on Nation Rise and on turbine fire suppression in particular. Examples of successful bylaws were provided. Ruby has again asked the mayor to sign a letter of concern for your health and our "highly vulnerable aquifer." We know people who left their home due to negative health impacts from infrasound. No one willingly walks away from their most important investment. We could go on.

We offered to share contacts and information. Our offers were not accepted so we took to council meetings, email, and media. Is that placing council under siege or just unwanted exposure? Did the parents of autistic children sit meekly by after budget cuts this spring? No, they fought for protections, for their loved ones, as have we.

Perhaps we have been too polite, as we have been repeatedly deferred without explanation or even an entry in minutes. Some feel that certain council members are supporting the interests of the wind company over residents. That perception would have evolved over time and inaction. It is their doing, not ours.

So, we ask council repeatedly for support or an explanation. Is that relentless? Yes, but certainly not rude, negative and toxic; unless one prefers not to answer to the public.

As you read this, you will now be aware of the cancellation of the Nation Rise approval. Is our work over? Probably not, as council has not yet put one single bylaw in place to regulate this project should it be successfully challenged or to prepare for any others that may be coming. Thank you for considering the "other side."

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





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Beyond 21 raising funds for future home

CORNWALL—A local support group needs more help to reach its goal of creating a welcoming place for adults with developmental disabilities.

Beyond 21 identifies itself as "dream chasers." The aim is to help adults with developmental disabilities stay connected, contribute and work on their dreams.

In a recent interview with *The Chesterville Record*, Jane McLaren, Beyond 21's executive director, was enthusiastic about its new "hub" at 1924 Pitt St. in Cornwall.

Renovations have begun but the group has a fundraising goal of \$750,000 and a deadline of May 2020. McLaren is proud to say that \$400,000 has been pledged to date.

The 8,000 sq. ft. building will be completely adapted and will include a sensory room and accessible washrooms. The executive director points out the need for flooring suitable for wheelchairs. In addition, they had to eliminate fluorescent lighting, as it emits a hum that can be disturbing to some of their participants.

"Our participants wear their challenge every day," says Jane McLaren, and as recently as 10 years ago, they faced institutional care or group homes. Beyond 21 gives them a chance to thrive in a safe environment that promotes respect and sees them as people first.

On Dec. 2, board president Tish Humphries asked for financial support from the South Glengarry council. She did not request a specific amount but rather suggested that any amount would help. Council transferred the request to the administration to see how they could support the project.

Beyond 21 does not receive government funding

but is self-financing through community fundraisers. The program was established to bridge the gap after young adults with disabilities "age out" of the school system at 21.

Beyond 21 runs programs that develop community connections, build life skills and provide social contacts. The group presently serves about 50 families with more on a waitlist. Half of the participants are from Cornwall, with the other half equally divided between the local counties, reaching Alexandria, Iroquois, Chesterville, and Akwesasne.







RUSSELL-The Russell Agricultural Society has made the nerve-wracking decision to change the dates of its annual fair, moving from the first weekend after Labour Day to Aug. 13 -16.

Society president Theresa Wever said there was little choice in the matter after midway provider Robertson Amusements said it would no longer split between the Russell and Spencerville Fairs. Depending on the calendar, these two events often collide on the same September dates. Robertson, in fact, picked the new dates, telling Russell organizers they could only service them on the weekend following the Navan Fair.

"There are only two other midway companies left in Ontario and they're both busy on our September weekend (Sept. 5-8 last year)," Wever explained. "The board even had discussions about possibly going ahead without a

midway... in the end. nobody wanted to do that."

The September dates have been a staple since the 1980s, changed from August after several years of bad weather: "In a sense, we're returning to where we were on the Ontario fair schedule."

The greatest concerns of any fair board when changing dates is losing the audience, jeopardizing certain attractions, and conflicting with other big events. Wever noted that the Vankleek Hill Fair is on the same August dates and, depending on the calendar, South Mountain would sometimes conflict. She felt that all three will be able to

attractions revolves around Russell Fair's Education Days, expanded last year to include Saturday.

The event attracted hundreds of local students who were in a way a captive audience while school was in. With school out in August, Wever suggested students will still be drawn the agricultural programming they've become accustomed to, and in fact, the plan now calls for Education Days to continue through Sunday.

"One advantage is that the university crowd is still around in August and we might be able to get them more involved in the fair. In September, they've left for their respective schools."

With an accent on keeping the fair family oriented, Wever said the outlook of the board is generally positive with members seeing as many opportunities as


