chard. As of Sept. 11, we had harvested over 240 lbs of vegetables. And we still have a number of items to harvest over the next few weeks."

We were excited to be able to see our clients' happy faces from their cars and have a little visit. We are going to continue these Drive Thru Diners for the upcoming months. For the month of October, the first one will be held Thursday, October 8th in Winchester in the back of our Centre, Thursday, October 15th in South Mountain at the Ag Hall parking lot and Tuesday, October 20th in Chesterville at the Nelson LaPrade Centre parking lot. If you wish to sign up for one of the Drive Thru Diners, or have any questions, please give us a call. Again, there will be criteria in place on how our Drive Thru Diners Program will be carried out and a limit of 40 diners for each of these events will be put in place. We were thrilled to get all the great feedback on how much everyone enjoyed their meal!

Our outdoor walking group, "Walk the Block", has 7 participants with room for more walkers. The walkers start out with stretching and then proceed to walk around the block, physically distancing by forming a single file. Each session will start at Nor-Dun Centre by the car port, weather permitting every Monday and Friday at 1:30 p.m.

As a result of the recent restrictions introduced by the Province of Ontario, resumption of inside programming has been placed on hold for the time being.

WINCHESTER-The North Dundas Parade of Lights will go ahead this year, but instead of rolling through the streets past hundreds of spectators, the spectators will be rolling past the floats.

The event, being dubbed the North Dundas Display of Lights, will have spectators stay in their vehicles as they enjoy the stationary floats and displays.

It will take place in a large, fenced-in lot at Rideau Auctions during the first weekend of December. Registration and admission will be free.

The volunteer Parade Committee, made up of Sandy Burns, Brianne Scott and Matthew Roy, has been working alongside the Eastern Ontario Health Unit, Rideau Auctions owner Hunter McCaig, the Municipality of North Dundas, and the OPP to ensure the event is safe for participants and spectators alike.

"We're very grateful to Hunter for generously allowing us to use his property as a location for this event," Burns said. "We will be encouraging our float participants to get creative with their displays this year, because for the first time, it doesn't have to be on wheels. They can set up a more elaborate display on the ground, and we can't wait to see what they come up

The EOHU has provided strict guidelines concerning the number of people on each float or display, which will be shared with registered float participants. But the committee says not every display needs to be 'manned', so long as it's lit up and makes good use of the space allotted. More details concerning registration, traffic flow and times for the event will be released in the coming weeks.

The Vendor Show will also take place, although on a smaller scale. EOHU guidelines require space between booths, which will limit the number of vendors allowed to register this year.

More details and registration forms will be available at the beginning of October. The vendor show will take place at the Joel Steele Community Centre on Sat., Dec. 5 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Masks and social distancing will be required.

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions, the committee will be unable to hold family-friendly events at the Old Town Hall this year.

Wubs Transit sold to First Student

On Sept. 16, First Student, a North American in student leader transportation signed an agreement to buy the North Dundas company.

Wubs Transit operates as a provider of school and charter bus services. They have approximately 30 busses and was founded in 2003.

The sale is a good one for First Student as it extends its operations in Ontario where company has nearly 40 locations and transports more than 200,000 students.

"Wubs Transit has a great team of drivers and staff who share in our mission to provide safe reliable transportation," said First Student president Paul Osland.

The decision to sell Wubs Transit was made after the passing of Richard and Nanda's son Robert two years ago of cancer. He was only 26.

The North Dundas couple had to take a look at what kind of lifestyle they wanted and what was most important to them.

They decided to slow down, focus on family and to do that decided to scale

business back their operations.

"When Robert passed away we decided that spending our time being stressed out an unfulfilled was unprofitable," said

They still own and operate Precision Diesel in Winchester and have added No Limits Auto Parts to their existing business. They have also invested in renovating a house in Winchester which will become an Airbnb when finished.

"We were approached by two companies about our business," she said.

"We had been thinking about doing this for a while."

She said they liked dealing with First Student and were pleased to know what they have built will be well looked after.

"All of the buses will remain the same with the same drivers," she said.

She explained the decision was a lifestyle change.

"First Student will be setting up a dispatch office in Winchester the same as they have in Prescott," she said.

"This is further evidence that we are executing our strategy to grow through acquisitions as well as contract wins. We will continue to search for opportunities to use our resources, insight and expertise to benefit school systems, students and families across North America."

The acquisition is First Student's third in the last 12 months. In January, the company acquired the Campeau Bus Lines locations in Ottawa and Bowmanville, Ontario. Last October, First Student acquired Hopewell Transportation, a Chicago land-based provider of school transportation services for special needs students and their families.

MORRISBURG - The Morrisburg roundabout and streetscaping project will revitalize County Road 2 through Morrisburg. The project is anticipated to cost approximately \$4-million.

The federal and provincial governments have confirmed funding in the amounts of \$1.52-million and \$1.01-million respectively, with the remaining costs attributed to South Dundas and the county.

The project is in the final stages of design, with the intent to undertake final reviews between the county and South Dundas, as well as a final public consultation and communication with impacted business owners.

The project is on schedule to be tendered in November and the results presented to council at the December meeting.

A hungry world

About two billion people, 25.9 per cent of the world population will face moderate or severe food insecurity in the near future.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the estimates show about 8.9 per cent of the world population, nearly 690 million people were hungry, as shown in a report published recently by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO).

Unfortunately, the world is "off track" in meeting the Sustainable Development Goals 2.1 Zero Hunger target by 2030 to end hunger and ensure access by all people, in particular the people in poor and vulnerable situations, including infants, to safe, nutritious and sufficient food all year round.

Now, due to COVID-19, an unprecedented health, economic and social crisis is threatening lives and livelihoods, making the achievement of these targets even more challenging.

Across the world, hunger and food insecurity have been growing slightly since 2015, and malnutrition still affects millions of children. The situation is likely to get worse, due to economic slowdowns and disruptions caused by a pandemic-triggered recession. Countries need to step up efforts to support small-scale food producers, conserve plant and animal genetic resources for food and agriculture, adopt measures to counter food price volatility,

proportion of government funds to agriculture, in line with agriculture's contribution to GDP.

Food waste

While it is not possible to estimate the percentage of food wasted at the retail and consumption stage yet, the percentage of food lost after harvest on farm and at the transport, storage and processing stages stands at 13.8 per cent globally, amounting to over 400billion US a year. In Canada, despite one in eight Canadians suffering from food insecurity, about 31 per cent of food in Canada is wasted, worth approximately \$49.5-billion. Different factors may result in food waste in the production stage such as over production, infrastructure technological gaps in the supply chain, environmental conditions, stringent aesthetic requirements, farm practices, financial and labour issues.

Global agricultural production

The global demand for agricultural products is anticipated to increase by 15 per cent over the coming decade. On the other hand, agricultural productivity is expected to increase faster over the same period helping to maintain the lower prices of the major agricultural products or maintain their current level as shown in the 2019 annual report of the Organization for Economic Cooperation allocate a greater and Development (OECD)

and the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). However, the COVID-19 pandemic may significantly impact global agricultural production.

Cereals: the global production of cereals is expected to increase by 1.2 per cent per year, due to yield improvement, to reach 3,053 million tonnes in 2028. Maize production is projected to increase the most (+181 million tonnes), followed by wheat (+86 million tonnes), rice (+66 million tonnes), and other coarse grains (+35 million tonnes). The industrial use of cereals as biofuels or starch is anticipated to have a modest increase.

World trade in cereals is

projected to increase by 20.3 per cent to reach 503 million tonnes by 2028. For wheat, the Russian Federation has become the top exporter of wheat since 2016 surpassing the European Union. The world wheat price is expected to decline slightly from 241USD/tonne in 2018 to 238 USD/tonne in 2028. For maize, the United States will remain the lead exporter. The world maize price is projected to increase from USD/tonne in 2018 to 186 USD/tonne in 2028. For the coarse grains (sorghum and barley), the European Union and Australia are expected to continue to be the main exporters. Similar to wheat, the world coarse grains prices are expected to decline slightly from 221 USD/tonne in 2018 to 216 USD/tonne in 2028. For rice, India, Thailand,

Vietnam, and Pakistan will continue as the top global suppliers. The world rice price is expected to increase from 447 USD/tonne in 2018 to 470 USD/tonne in 2028. However, the international trade environment for cereal is facing some uncertainties due to trade tensions and regional trade agreements.

Oilseeds: vegetable oil includes oil obtained from the crushing of soybeans and other oilseeds (about 55 per cent of world vegetable oil production), palm oil (35 per cent), as well as palm kernel, coconut and cottonseed oils. The global soybean production is projected to continue to expand at 1.6 per cent yearly due to the production growth over the coming decade in India, the Russian Federation, Ukraine, and Canada. Global demand for vegetable oil will expand by +28 million tonne by 2028, which is likely to draw down high inventories and support vegetable oil prices over the outlook period.

grandchildren, six brothers and their families, as well as a multitude of cousins for which I am thankful for. I remember daily my Mom and Dad who have passed and give thanks that they never gave up on me, or my brothers, and I remember with love my Aunt Annie, Aunt Bess and Uncle Allan who were the closest things to grandparents I experienced.

Both my maternal and paternal grandparents died before I was born and though my older brothers have some memory of them, I only know them through the stories my Mom told while Daddy was out going to school board meetings, working at Nestlé or doing community work. It was a bit of a surprise to me when I discovered that my maternal grandparents were really my maternal great - grandparents and my Aunt Zillah was my grandmother and this unknown individual Charles Conroy my maternal grandfather.

Charles, or Charlie as I sometimes call him, was a British Home Child who came to Canada in the early 1900's with the Catholic Emigration Service from London England. I have absolutely no idea what he looked like as I don't have a picture of him but have learned a bit about him from my Conroy cousins and research. He was 16 when he came to Canada, stayed for a while at St. George's House in Ottawa before being indentured to a farmer in Stittsville. He worked

as a cook at Boston Lunch in Ottawa and for years had or worked at a moving company. Before he came to Canada, he had spent his youth in a pretty rough part of London – the east end near the docks (before this area was a fashionable part of London) his grandparents spent their old age in a workhouse and when his parents died poverty really claimed the Conroy family. He was living at the St. Nicholas Industrial School when given the opportunity to emigrate to this country and took advantage of it.

He was lucky, some of our BHC ancestors were not so fortunate. Many were abused to the point where they ran away, were killed or took their own life. We should remember the ones like my grandfather for whom the promise of a fresh start came true, but also acknowledge for many their hopes and dreams were a bit harder to come by. In my mind, the British Home Children are an indication of the strength and resilience of the human spirit.

This Sept. 28, British Home Child Day in Ontario and British Home Child Day in Canada, I will spend some time thinking about Grandpa Charlie and the other thousands of children, some as young as three, who came to this country full of hope for a new life. For me, I am a proud descendant of a British Home Child.

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Serious assault with a weapon: Public's assistance requested

NORTH DUNDAS - The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Stormont Dundas and Glengarry Crime Unit are continuing to investigate a serious assault with a weapon that occurred on Spruce Drive in North Dundas Township.

On Sept. 17 at approximately 6:09 p.m. SD&G OPP responded to an assault where one adult male suspect approached an adult female victim and assaulted her with an edged weapon, the suspect then fled the scene. The suspect fled the location on a red bicycle.

The OPP Emergency Response team members (ERT), Canine unit and OPP helicopter attended the location with unsuccessful attempts to locate the suspect.

The adult female victim suffered a stab wound and

was transported to hospital with non-life threatening injuries. The suspect was unknown to the victim.

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

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
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Everything old is new again



Putting the eat back in meat

WINCHESTER – Greg's Quality Meats is arguably the oldest independently owned business in the Winchester area.

Greg Van Dellen along with partner Jake Cinnamon have strived to make their business as personal and accountable as they can by maintaining their high standards and best in quality meat products.

Greg's Quality Meats uses naturally and locally raised beef and all of their poultry and pork products are 100 per cent Canadian.

Their business was established in 1988. It specializes in the best texture and tenderness and flavour they can get.

"We carry an assortment of deli meats, cheese, smoked meats, and more," said Van Dellen.

The meat business has changed over the years.

"You used to make your sauces by hand but now you have a mixer," said Van Dellen.

"You used to have to stuff sausages by hand but now we have a machine to do it as well as grinders."

He remembers when his shop used to have service counters, now the counters are self-serve.

Cinnamon said, "Over the years people have changed the way they shop."

But now he believes people are changing their buying habits and starting to want the kind of quality only found in a local shop like his. People seem to want a more local shopping experience and to know where their food is coming from.

Van Dellen said, "We are as local as we can be. Even our employees are local."

He said the local dollars that come into his shop go back out into the local economy.

The current generation is more concerned about how the food they eat impacts on their health over the longterm. Gluten has become a big issue for

"We make a lot of gluten free products," said Van Dellen. "We make all our own chicken fingers, meatballs and sausages. They are all made right here. Our beef has nothing in it because it is pure." They also prepare beef for farmers who want them to cut it up for

They also do a great deal of wild meat in the fall. "We do a lot of wild game pepperettes and sausages," said Van Dellen.

The two have chosen to avoid expanding into other kinds of food. "Meat is what we do best," said Cinnamon.

Establishing a longstanding business in the community has not always been easy.

There are always challenges to overcome.

"I can remember when times were tough and I had to live with my family in the back of the store. We sectioned part of it off and moved in," said Van Dellen. "Those are trying times for any small business, but once you get through that you can be successful," he said.

These days Jake and Greg enjoy learning something new ever day.

During COVID-19, they have had to learn to adapt to the new rules. They have reconfigured their shop to accommodate the rules and shoppers. They feel the the current situation has allowed shoppers to slow down a little bit and think more about their health and what they eat every day, and that leads them back to their store where people can trust the meat they will be eating.

SMITHS FALLS - The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is urging all motorists not to veer for wildlife after responding to multiple car/deer collisions over the weekend.

"If you spot a deer or other animal on the road ahead, stay in control, reduce your speed as much as possible and steer straight," says inspector Dave Tovell, OPP manager of Traffic and Marine Programs in East Region. "Don't veer for deer. By changing your direction precautions.

quickly, you increase the risk of losing control, running off the roadway and rolling your vehicle. This increases the likelihood of sustaining greater damage to your vehicle and serious injury."

Some other helpful hints to ensure a safe journey during this time of year are as follows:

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South Nation Conservation to hold online art auction to raise funds for local tree planting

FINCH – South Nation in-person Conservation (SNC) will be holding an online silent art auction called "Art for Trees" in October to help raise funds for local tree planting.

Over a dozen pieces of environmental-themed artwork have been donated by local artists for the auction, including (but not limited to) the works of Carrie Keller of Winchester, Carey's Carving in Russell, Laura Stevens of Finch, Aleta Karstad of North Grenville, Paul Schibli of Russell, Ina Schneider of Cornwall, and the late artist and entertainer Ronald Leonard of Toronto.

All funds raised will go towards helping SNC reach its milestone goal of planting over 200,000 trees across its 4,441 squarekilometre watershed jurisdiction in Eastern Ontario next spring.

Since 1990, SNC has planted more than 3.4 million trees across its watershed thanks to community and municipal partnerships and fundraising initiatives. The most trees ever planted by the Conservation Authority in a single year was roughly 190,000 in 1993.

Due to the COVID-19

fundraising events, including its annual charity golf tournament, were cancelled this year. These fundraising events have also previously funded environmental education programs for local youth and property upgrades at public Conservation Areas.

SNC is close to reaching its 2021 tree planting goal: over 140,000 trees are currently reserved for projects next spring; but the Conservation Authority is looking for a push past the finish line and hopes the Art for Trees auction can help plant more trees.

"A portion of our annual operating budget is made up of self-generated revenue and fundraising," explains Taylor Campbell, SNC's communications specialist.

"The local community has been extremely supportive of this initiative, and we couldn't be more excited to partner with them to break a new tree planting record."


