# Crysler business rewarded for their community efforts

CRYSLER - The pandemic created challenges for just about every aspect of daily life in Rural Ontario.

Leadership and help has come from many directions and one of them is from the Old General Store in Crysler.

The store has been awarded second place along with a \$3,000 prize in a contest called Big Grant for Small Business sponsored by the Grenville Mutual Insurance Company.

The theme of the competition was what individuals and businesses were doing to survive the emotional and financial hardship imposed on them by the pandemic.

Small business owners had the

opportunity to submit a short essay style submission to our Facebook contest page.

Mark Kenny and his partner Philip Bissonnette took over the Old General Store four years ago. It had been owned by Philip's family for the past 20 years and is a cornerstone business for residents in Crysler.

They submitted an essay about what they had been doing to help their community during the pandemic back in October.

"We do a lot here. Lots of baked goods." fresh food and soups. We bought it as a convenience store and turned it into a kind of store slash restaurant," said Kenny.

Their essay described how they had to reduce hours, and they had to diversify so they started to deliver to the elderly and people who were at home self-isolating.

# Chesterville resident back under the microscope for murder

CHESTERVILLE They say the past is never

really over and done with. Jimmy Wise, formally a Chesterville resident, and now a resident of a Winchester nursing home, confined to a wheelchair after a stroke, has been accused of first degree murder.

The remains Chesterville resident, Ray Collison were found in 2014 in a culvert, in North Dundas near the Village of Morewood.

Collison had been missing since 2009.

This month, November 2020, Jimmy Wise finds himself on trial for the murder. The original court proceedings were to be in

Cornwall but were later moved to Ottawa.

Wise's trial began on Nov. 9 and the prosecution has said they can prove that Wise, who was an acquaintance of Collison shot him in the back of the head with a 22-caliber

Wise has been in the crosshairs of the police in the past.

In 1987, police were investigating a string of murders in the Ottawa

Wise was a suspect but was never charged.

Despite not being charged, Wise remained under police surveillance and had his phones tapped.

In 1989 he sued the Crown and the OPP for \$1million and eventually

settled out of court.

At the same time he was a suspect in another case and accused of damaging a \$2.3 million

communications tower south of Ottawa. The case lasted 11 years and ended

up in the Supreme Court. where Wise was found not guilty.

In the current case unfolding in Ottawa, Crown Attorney Jason Pilon claims he has 58 witnesses who can link Wise to the

Collison murder.

Apparently there is proof that Wise threatened Collison in the weeks before the murder.

Wise operated a garage in North Dundas and claim he witnesses threatened Collison and told him to stay away from his

garage.

Ian Carter, Defense attorney for Wise has said Wise insists he is not guilty; Jon Doody also represents Wise.

The trial held in the Ontario Superior Court of Justice in Ottawa is expected to last six weeks.

# **Opening libraries safely**

CHESTERVILLE - Curb-side pick-up is now available for SDG Library branches in Avonmore, South Mountain and Williamsburg according to a press release dated Nov. 17 by Todd Lihou, corporate communications coordinator. These three branches join Chesterville, Iroquois, Finch, Maxville, Long Sault and Williamstown who have been open for curb-side pickup since October.

Lihou explained curb-side pick up "means that patrons may request materials to be picked up at any of these branches, although short stays and browsing are not yet available." Director of library services, Karen Franklin

commented "It has always been our goal to be able to reopen all our branches when it was safe for us to do." She praised the work of staff to "prepare these last three branches for re-opening, just as days are getting shorter and colder temperatures are upon us."

Currently, the SDG branches in Crysler, Winchester, Morrisburg, Ingleside, Lancaster and Alexandria "allow short stays of up to 30 minutes where patrons may browse the collections and borrow materials or use the public computers."

In addition to these services, "the SDG Library continues to offer a variety of digital resources (eBooks, eNewspapers, eMagazines, subject databases and online tutorials), and several "virtual" programs that can be accessed from the comfort of home." 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
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# South Dundas celebrates business community with second annual Awards of Excellence

While driving my granddaughter to school today, we got to talking about Christmas and Christmas cookies. After a bit of discussion, I believe it was decided that she and her Mom would come over some Saturday to make some cookies for her and Winston (her cousin who lives in Ottawa) with her Uncle Graeme making a "car visit" to pick them up.

She seemed to enjoy the stories of when her Mom and two uncles were young and making Christmas cookies. While she insisted, we decorate them, she laughed when I told her I never really got the chance cause the cookies were usually eaten too quickly. After I dropped her off at school I

began thinking back to the days when I was a youngster and watched my Mom make her once a year Scottish Shortbread Christmastime.

I recall watching Mom in the kitchen at the house on King Street getting the butter and smoothing the brown sugar into it before adding the flour.

She would mix it up and put the crumbly mixture into a 9x9 cake pan, pat it down, prick the top in many places with a fork and put it into a "slow" oven to bake. Awhile later it would come out of the oven, lightly browned and with a melt in your mouth texture. After cooling, came the cutting into squares and often she would keep two pieces of shortbread aside for "the cooks" and while I munched mine, she put the precious pieces in one of those holiday cookie

tins. Except for some pies and perhaps a fruitcake this was the only Christmas baking Mom would do.

For many years I had a copy of her recipe, but to be honest sometime over years - probably when I was busy cleaning clearing and didn't keep an eye on the small piece of paper it is written on - I lost it. Luckily in this day and age, the world wide web came to my rescue and I could share with you a reasonable facsimile of her recipe, but in the interests of all that is wonderful about shortbread, will share it once I have baked and tasted it. I have a feeling though it might not taste the same as how I remember the shortbread on King Street tasted. I have an idea though - why not haul out that favourite recipe you have for Christmas sweet and bake up a storm this holiday season.

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# WDMH diabetes program finds new ways to care for patients during COVID-19

WINCHESTER – In the Eastern Counties, more than 11.5 per cent of the population is living with diabetes. At the Winchester District Memorial Hospital (WDMH), our Diabetes Education Team is working hard to help local residents manage this chronic condition - especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. A key part of that care is patient education. "This pandemic has presented some new challenges for our team to best serve people living with diabetes in the area. Diabetes doesn't go away in a pandemic. For some people, the resulting changes in lifestyle has made it more difficult to live with diabetes," notes Deirdre Cooke, registered dietitian and founder of the WDMH program. The WDMH program is embracing technology to meet patient needs. Patients are being reached through phone calls and or virtual visits through the Ontario Telemedicine (OTN) or Zoom. The team has just completed a patient survey of past patients at the

WDMH program. "The results are encouraging and show 82.6 per cent of people who responded were interested to some degree in attending virtual classes," Deirdre. WDMH's Diabetes Education Program was created in 1998 and is free of charge. The team includes a registered nurse, two registered dietitians, an administrative clerk, and has an endocrinologist who is on site three times a month. The program provides education to people living with both type II and type I diabetes, gestational diabetes, as well as people on insulin pumps or diagnosed with pre-

Whether you have prediabetes, are newly diagnosed with diabetes or even if you've been living with diabetes for years, WDMH has an education program that will fit your needs. Physician referrals are not required to participate in the program. If you have questions, please call 613-774-2420, ext. 6765 or email diabetes@wdmh.on.ca. Diabetes Awareness Month

pneumonia, and they are almost three times more likely to die in hospital. Today, one in three Canadians has diabetes\* or prediabetes, and those at age 20 now face a 50 per cent chance of developing disease. staggering number speaks to the epidemic that diabetes has become across Canada.



# Obituary – Winston Ball


Our loss is immeasurable but so is the love he has left behind... Winston Ball of Chesterville died

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



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


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# South Dundas disappointed in SNC levy increase

SOUTH DUNDAS -This year's South Nation Conservation (SNC) 2021 budget has raised an eyebrow here and there but none higher than in South Dundas.

The 12 directors at the SNC board voted to approve the levy for 2021 in October.

On Nov. 19 they approved their 2021 budget.

are serviced by the SNC and they are facing a 3.5 per cent increase despite an estimated \$250,000 surplus for SNC, that some feel would be better spent offsetting the levy increase.

South Dundas will have an increase of \$2,477, bringing their total for the year to \$84,739. North Dundas will be billed an extra \$4,903, bringing their yearly total to \$95,241.

All of the directors voted Sixteen municipalities for the increase except for one director, and that was South Dundas councillor, Archie Mellan.

The negative vote by Mellan was based on his belief that during these times with so many sectors of the community having to show some financial restraint, SNC should do so as well.

The projected surplus should to some, have been spent on all of the levy increases for the 16 municipalities or at least

used to minimize the impact of any increase. "The negative vote that I brought up was at the Levy meeting before the budget meeting," he said. "I strongly encouraged the other board of directors not to support the levy as submitted, which was approximately 3.5 per cent over the year before, with the fact there was almost a \$250,000 surplus that would carry over into 2021," said Mellan.

"I just felt that with everything that was going on this year with COVID- 19, now was the time to show a little bit of restraint and keep that levy back to zero or at least bring it back to one or 1.5 per cent increase. I did not get very far," he said.

A letter from South Dundas to the SNC chair, Ottawa Coun. George Darouze, stated: "This council supports Coun. Mellan's attempt to keep the levy increase to zero for 2021.

South Dundas appreciates the impact SNC has had on environmental issues; however, due to the impact SNC has on all residents and municipalities, if there ever was a time to keep things at par and do with a bit less, this is it."

The letter went on to express that they were not pleased that there was no attempt to use the projected surplus of \$250,000 to keep the levy down.

Darouze stated: "To balance the needs of 16 municipalities compromise is needed; that is how we have generally arrived at the two per cent increase."


