

New water source for fighting fires in North Dundas

SOUTH MOUNTAIN – North and South Dundas have worked together to install a dry hydrant on County Road 16, which will benefit both area fire departments in the future.

The dry hydrant will provide additional water supply for firefighting.

A dry hydrant has no working parts. It is nothing more than a large pipe that is connected to another pipe at the bottom of a water source. Fire trucks can connect to it and pump water directly from the water source into another fire truck.

This particular pipe is about 12 feet deep and then turns to run into the quarry.

Up until now, North Dundas firefighters had to replenish their water supply in Hallville or in Winchester. Now they will have a water source enabling them to operate more efficiently and effectively. The dry hydrant gives them access to water at the south end of the township.

New water source

South Dundas will now have a water source at the north western part of their township.

The cost was around \$11,000 and was split between the two townships.

The hydrant is connected to an old quarry that routinely fills with water from the surrounding area.

Once hooked up to a fire truck, it can pump up to 3,500 gallons of water into a fire truck in four minutes.

The quarry is owned by Dean Keyes. His family has been farming in the area for several generations. The family has owned the quarry site since 1951. It is about 18 feet deep at its deepest.

Keyes said he was talking to Mountain Fire Station number 2 deputy chief Don Levere one day and the conversation ended up being

about possible water sources the fire department could take advantage of. Keyes was quick to suggest the unused quarry as a possible site.

Deputy mayor and fire commissioner Al Armstrong gathered at the site on Sat., Dec. 12 with Mountain Fire Chief Ray Sherrer, Deputy Chief Don Levere, Parker Havekes and Dean Keyes.

The group were at the dry hydrant site because it was now operational.

“What we have right here alleviates an ongoing problem that we have had in Mountain Township for quite a while,” said Deputy Mayor Armstrong.

He said they had been looking for a reliable water source for at least ten years.

“We now have something we believe will be a source of consistent water,” he said.

Armstrong mentioned that no one has ever seen the quarry empty.

“It is a real source of

pride and happiness.” Keyes said, “As a member of the farming community we are so fortunate to have the fire department here; you are always there; I am happy you’re able to make use of this pond.”

Fire chief Ray Sherrer said, “I would just like to thank Mr. Keyes for allowing us to use his quarry; we have put in a turnaround here so that we do not have to access his property.”

He said for ten years they have been trying to find a way to make existing water facilities work.

He mentioned that it was a simple conversation that led to this moment.

“Our neighbours to the south will have total access to this as well.”

Armstrong noted that the firefighters are always helping their community and the establishment of the dry hydrant is a great example of how the township’s fire

department are always thinking of ways of make the community safer.

“The fire department is the one essential service that we have that makes sure everybody can sleep properly at night,” said Armstrong.

He explained that insurance ratings the area has is because of the efficiency of the fire department.

The dry hydrant was installed by Havekes Land Improvement. Parker Havekes, did the work. He is also a North Dundas

firefighter. He said he had a great deal to do to make the land around the dry hydrant accessible to fire trucks. The ditched area along the side of the road required gravel to a depth of about five feet.

The North Dundas Parade of Lights' committee would like to thank everyone who helped make this year's 'Display of Lights' such a huge success.

This year, rather than cancel the parade altogether, we decided to shift to a stationary event held at Rideau Auctions.

Having spectators drive past stationary floats, allowed the participants more creative leeway than a traditional parade provides, resulting in some of the most creative and awe-inspiring entries ever.

Over the two nights the event took place, more than 1,200 vehicles drove through the display area to take in the Christmas celebration. Community Food Share collected donations for the food bank and the North Dundas Christmas Fund, as vehicles lined up in the parking lot.

Over the weekend, they collected \$6,134.82, more than double the totals generally received during a traditional parade.

Fries for Charity met vehicles at the exit, exchanging delicious French fries for donations. They raised \$6,339.25, all of which will be given to Cassandra Young and Jessica Goodenough, victims of a tragic bonfire incident who both suffered serious burns. The funds will assist with their travel, parking, meals, medication, bandages, and loss of income as they will have numerous appointments to treat their injuries.

An open letter from the Medical Officer of Health

With the holidays upon us and 2020 winding down, I would like to take a moment to reflect on this past year.

There is no doubt that it has been a challenging year for all of us. The COVID-19 pandemic has required us to change the way we do things and interact with one another.

From inconveniences such as wearing masks, to waiting in lines to enter buildings, to having to keep a distance from others, it's been stressful and frustrating. It has been especially hard on our families and relationships as we've had to find other ways to juggle family, school and work, and to stay connected with those we care about. For too many, the year has also brought hardship and tragedy, from lost financial stability to lost loved ones who have perished from the coronavirus. In our community and across the globe, COVID-19 has taken a heavy toll.

In spite of the challenges we've faced, our community has largely come together to help protect one another from the spread of the virus,

following public health precautions such as masking and social distancing when out in public, and finding alternative ways to connect with loved ones and to look out for each other. Many of our local businesses, schools and healthcare workers have made extraordinary efforts to prevent spread of the virus. Collectively, our efforts have helped avoid uncontrolled spread of COVID-19 in our community, and for this I am extremely grateful.

There are also many creative ways to celebrate the holidays safely with family and friends who we don't live with, such as having virtual gatherings, and sharing meals or opening gifts together

online. We can also help keep everyone safe by limiting trips into the community to essential errands only, and staying home when we aren't feeling well. When we are out in public, we should continue to avoid crowds, wear our masks, keep 2 metres distance from others and clean our hands regularly.

In spite of the year's hardships, 2020 is drawing to an end with reason for optimism – vaccines are on the horizon which will help reduce the impact of COVID-19 on our lives and allow for the gradual return to more normal activities. In the meantime, let's continue to follow public health precautions and keep our loved ones and our community safe so that we can look forward together to better times in 2021.

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

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Beyond 21 – Making dreams come true

CORNWALL – The Hub for the Beyond 21 Foundation was opened on Nov. 21 with 8,000 square feet of space designed to provide people with developmental disabilities an opportunity to learn life-skills and socialize in a safe and caring environment. The event was held outside the facility's location at 1924 Pitt St. in Cornwall, with local dignitaries, staff, board members, Grant Marion and representatives from the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 297 in Cornwall.

Tish Humphries founded Beyond 21 in 2011 after checking "out what opportunities there were in our communities for a young woman with developmental disabilities, who at 21 would have to leave the school system" when her daughter Emma turned 18. She discovered "there was nothing" available for her daughter and "began doing research across the province to see if there were any programs operating to meet the needs of young people like Emma."

After a town hall meeting, consultations with stakeholders and in-deep research across the province, Beyond 21 received registration as a not-for-profit organization in 2011. For six years, the organization was housed in the former General Vanier/T.R. Leger site before moving two years ago "into the basement of Knox St. Paul Church" until "COVID hit and we closed our program."

Humphries explained Beyond 21 "supports 40-50 families at this time, with many more on the waiting list" from all areas of Stormont Dundas and

Glengarry. She continued how more participants in Beyond 21 requires more staff needed as "we receive no government funding," this creates a problem; explaining how "our funding comes from grants, fundraisers, philanthropic donations and tons of hard work."

During these years, "the Hub, as we named it was a gathering space where the participants and program facilitators could meet and do all kinds of activities, eat a homemade lunch together" and enjoy "new friendships and old ones" and have outings in the

community such as bowling, going to the library or other activities prior to the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The planning for the new building began three years ago when "a very generous funder purchased" it for Beyond 21, and planning consultations began with Grant Marion Construction. In May of 2019, a capital campaign began "to raise the much-needed funds" with a goal of "\$750,000.00

but increased construction costs" necessitated raising "a bit over \$1,000,000.00 to finish our project."

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, planned fundraisers had to be cancelled, with Humphries commenting "We are blessed to have the financial support from the City of Cornwall, South Glengarry and the United Counties of SDG" before commenting how "the overall public has been amazing given the difficult times we are all going through."

The Hub for the Beyond 21 Foundation will be able

enjoy and experience, and a dedicated green space in the back that will see a beautiful donated gazebo, raised gardens and a barbecue." She also mentioned how in the future, "we will give the opportunity to our families and participants to assist us in setting the direction and to chase their dreams." Looking ahead, she commented how in the future, Beyond 21 "would like to apply for a grant to hire a graduate

student to develop the model of Beyond 21" which could be shared with other municipalities.

She expressed her thanks to the many people who have assisted Beyond 21 in their journey over the past 10 years. She mentioned that the Upper Canada District School Board director of education, David Thompson, Grant Marion Construction as well as "the donations and support at all our events"

from the local communities as well as the board of directors whom she described as "the most amazing team [she has] been privileged to work with." She concluded the email interview by thanking "our donors who keep giving. It is because of you and your generosity that Beyond 21 will come to fruition." It will be "a place to belong" which will, "soon open its doors to welcome you home!"

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Mayors' Messages

South Stormont

The year 2020 has been one like we have never experienced before. The COVID-19 pandemic has required each and every one of us to reexamine the way we live our lives, the way we do business, and perhaps even mindfully appreciating the things we may have taken for granted in the past.

Like other businesses across the country, your local township offices had to adapt to the restrictions put in place to keep our communities safe from the spread of the virus. I'm very proud of how the township of South Stormont council and staff were able to make these adaptations with minimal service disruptions to our residents.

While the township office and facilities were closed to the public for a period of time, staff were committed to providing the best customer service we could with the circumstances we were all experiencing. Online services that were previously not available were quickly implemented in a brand-new township website, which allowed residents to quickly submit documents and requests. Staff were able to maintain township business using these new online methods, over the telephone and through email. These services will continue moving forward, with additional online

methods being implemented to provide even more improvements to customer service, on top of traditional in-person means.

In 2020, the township also moved to a more transparent council meeting process, offering residents the opportunity to livestream every council meeting from the comfort of their own home through our website at southstormont.ca/councilmeetings. We encourage residents to be involved in their local government and tune into council meetings as much as they can. Residents can also go back and view previous council meetings at a time that is most convenient to them, and even click through to topics covered that are of most interest to them. This new tool was in the works prior to COVID-19, however as council meetings were restricted to online participation and closed to the public, the tool became even more crucial in 2020.

While maintaining the services our residents have come to expect from their local government, we are always seeking ways to improve our level of service and streamlining our processes. That is why in 2020 a Service Delivery Review was undertaken, with a number of recommendations brought to council and staff that would help us achieve those goals.

Those recommendations will be considered by council in the coming months, and priority goals being set, and an implementation plan developed to begin addressing gaps in our services and finding efficiencies to better serve the public.

Finally, a major project that took some exciting steps forward in 2020 was the Waterfront Development Plan. Residents have been frustrated with the lack of accessible waterfront areas across our township, and we have established a much-improved partnership with the St. Lawrence Parks Commission to not only improve access to the waterfront for residents and visitors to our area, but also to improve the offerings available in those designated waterfront areas. Developments such as

new outdoor recreation facilities, entertainment spaces, accessible natural features, and more are all on the table for the long-term plans of our waterfront, and we look forward to working with our partners to begin to see some of those aspects come to fruition beginning in 2021.

It has been a challenging year for all of us, and the effort and dedication to ensuring a safe community by our residents has not gone unnoticed. On behalf of my colleagues on council and staff at the township of South Stormont, I want to wish everyone a very safe and happy holiday season.

I don't think many elected officials have started their year-in-review with the following type of statement: I am anxious to put 2020 behind us and look forward to a much-improved 2021. I had quite a list of priorities that I had hoped to tackle, when I was elected as your member of Parliament.

The Cornwall waterfront lands, compassionate bereavement leave, and small farm and farm succession taxation issues were just a few issues I had hoped to address. Like most of you, however, when the COVID-19 pandemic took front and centre in March, I had to set aside my plans and confront the financial and health crisis before us. Since Parliament has resumed in a hybrid format in September, however, I have been able to move some of these priorities forward.

Help is at hand if you need it

NORTH DUNDAS – The pandemic has had far-reaching consequences that go beyond health, economic and political issues.

Dealing with COVID-19 is not just about dealing with a virus but also about the emotional, financial and mental impact it has had on individuals and their families.

The Access to Resources in the Community (ARC) program can help residents in the North Dundas region access resources to help them cope with the stress and disruption caused by the pandemic. The Ontario Ministry of Health is supporting the evaluation of that program in our region.

"The program was created to help people deal with all of the difficulties it has brought on," said Simone Dahrouge, Project Lead.

ARC offers residents an easy way for them to navigate their way to resources they need by connecting them with an experienced ARC Navigator. The ARC Navigator can help residents by connecting them to the appropriate programs and resources, helping them fill out forms and supporting them along the process.

Dahrouge explained the COVID-19 pandemic has created a lot of disruption

to people's lives. It has necessitated physical distancing and the confinement of people to their homes, required many businesses to suspend activities, resulting in layoffs and threats to income, and generally increased the level of health related anxieties and depression in communities.

"We have helped people join stress reduction programs, enroll in government financial assistance programs, engage in virtual activities to reduce social isolation, and find many other services to help them address their needs," said Dahrouge.

She noted there were many services available to people who do not know they are out there for them.

There are programs to help with financial issues, such as income loss, and mental health services dealing with anxiety and depression. There are programs related to social support, physical activities, personal safety, food security and more.



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Mental health takes centre stage

BERWICK – As the Dec. 8 North Stormont council meeting began, Coun. Randy Douglas delivered an eloquent and heartfelt statement on the recent death of a young North Stormont resident following “a long battle with mental health issues that caused all kinds of challenges for himself and his loved ones the past few years.”

Douglas raised some very important questions

about the issue of mental health.

The first dealt with the services and resources available to residents “when they are in mental health crisis, and to ask the province whether there are enough resources available in SDG right now.”

He continued that assistance is available at the “Cornwall Hospital Community Addiction and Mental Health Centre and Youth Wellness Hubs for those aged between 12 and 25.”

He noted how this year

has been a very stressful year and “mental health services are more important now as they have ever been,” noting how the pandemic has affected and required the reallocation of government services “away from their stated intent.” Douglas then commented how with “so many demands, and so limited number of professionals and services, but we can [still] ask the province if this part of Eastern Ontario is getting its fair share.”

He then discussed the effect social media can

have on people.

Douglas then mentioned the “personal attacks” which public officials are often subjected to during their tenure and how this could “at its worst be profoundly negative and discourage others from service in the future.”

He spoke of the need to “promote getting our community groups going again” when it is safe to do so, to benefit our mental health.

Douglas asked council and the CAO “if we should have a future delegation bring us more information” before thanking “all those

in the mental health field who are working so hard to take care of the vulnerable.”

In response to a query to North Stormont CAO Craig Calder about Douglas’ request, he replied “I have reached out to the OPP, CMHA and communicated with a private mental health professional since the meeting,” noting “the activities to move this forward will be multilayered,” with information being provided to the CAO by the CMHA representative “on both local and provincial

support services” which will be posted on “the township website and Facebook pages for maximum exposure once in receipt of these materials.”

He expressed hope for a zoom delegation at a council meeting in the new year and noted “Coun. Douglas is communicating with our Rec. coordinators, and we will facilitate initial discussions on how to encourage participation and re-engage our community and strengthen our already robust volunteer groups as the COVID crisis evolves.

Little things make a big difference

WINCHESTER – When Lisa Vaters came to the Emergency Department at the Winchester District Memorial Hospital in November, she was anxious. “Everyone is nervous going into a hospital on a good day, let alone during a pandemic,” says Lisa. “But I couldn’t ignore what was going on.”

Lisa says her fears quickly subsided. “Everyone was fantastic. There was someone right at the door explaining what to do. From there, a nurse listened to my concerns, tests were ordered, and I was provided with good care. Everyone was kind, respectful and supportive.”

Lisa says that it was the little things that meant a lot. “The doctor actually sat down to talk to me. Someone brought me a warm blanket. And even listening to the staff working so well together on the other side of the curtain was comforting; it was music to my ears.”

“Every day, staff and physicians at WDMH work hard to make each patient and family experience the best it can be,” explains Cholly Boland, CEO. “We are very proud of the most recent patient satisfaction survey results, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic.”

The quarterly surveys ask patients about their overall care and if they would recommend the hospital to their family and friends. For surveys conducted from April to June, 96 per cent of patients would recommend the Emergency Department to family, above the provincial average of 93 per cent. For WDMH’s maternity program, 100 per cent of the respondents said they would recommend this service; higher than the provincial average of 97 per cent. Likewise, 98 per cent of Day Surgery patients would recommend WDMH’s service, where the provincial average was 97 per cent. And on the

Medical/Surgical Unit, it’s 94 per cent, above the provincial average of 93 per cent. The data is collected by the National Research Corporation Canada (NRCC), an independent research institute.

Lisa Vaters says that based on her experience, she is not surprised to hear these results. “I actually started to cry, but in a good way,” she smiles. “I knew I was in the right place.”

“It’s a team effort,” sums up Cholly Boland. “Patient satisfaction is a result of the patient’s entire experience and involves every person the patient had contact with, from our COVID-19 screeners at the front door, to support staff that work behind the scenes.”

Giving back to the community

MORRISBURG – Located in Morrisburg, Timmy’s Place opened in 2001 with a goal to raise funds for Timothy Christian School (TCS) located in Williamsburg, as well as providing a location where affordable, used clothing and household items can be purchased in the community. Richard Zandbergen, who has been involved with Timmy’s Place since it began, explained while the store’s goal is primarily to raise funds for Timothy Christian School, it has also provided financial support to organizations such as Community Food Share in Morrisburg, Harvest House and Naomi’s Family Resource Centre.

Zandbergen was part of a committee composed of Mattie Zandbergen, Hennie Heuvel, Jennie Burri and George Bunsveld who worked together to plan and create Timmy’s Place as a fundraising opportunity for TCS. Originally, Timmy’s Place was located in a 900 square foot storefront in the Pinkus Mall, before it moved to its current location in the Morrisburg Village Plaza in 2007. Zandbergen explained that stores in the plaza were privately owned, as the plaza was constructed to replace Main Street stores demolished due to the construction of the Seaway. Timmy’s Place storefront is now approximately 2,800

square feet, and is owned by the Friends of Timothy Christian School.

While describing the process by which the store was developed, he mentioned

committee members had expressed some concern about donations from the community. Once the store opened it was apparent there was a great deal of support

from the community in terms of customers and donations being received. Zandbergen explained Timmy’s Place accepts clothing and household items in good condition; they are sorted and what is not used at the store is provided to a Cerebral Palsy organization for use in fundraising opportunities.

When asked about changes at Timmy’s Place over the years, he mentioned how they have been mainly to the interior of the store. He explained that about two years ago they began hanging articles such as clothing from the ceiling as opposed to the more traditional “floor rack” style of display. He commented this makes it easier for store maintenance as well as for making it very accessible for clients.

Zandbergen noted how in addition to shoppers from the local area frequenting the store, Timmy’s Place has a loyal following of regular customers from further away, who stop in when they visit the Morrisburg area.

Parliamentary Greetings

Stormont, Dundas, South Glengarry

After a year of challenges like no other in the past 100 years, conditions are finally lining up to allow 2021 to be one of renewal and recovery. By this time next year, I am optimistic that we will be well on our way to remaking our region to be one of the best places in the world to live, work, and raise a family.

Any reflection of 2020 should start with our front-line workers’ tremendous sacrifice and tireless hard work, especially early on when so little was known about the virus and its health impacts. Without them, it is hard to imagine how any of our communities could have coped with the demands of trying to protect everyone while slowing the spread of COVID-19. There were so many selfless acts of kindness, from the simple checking in on the well-being of others, to picking up their groceries, and more.

The most shocking realization of this past year was how little of our country’s emergency supplies were manufactured here in Canada. Everything from facemasks to ventilators and other critical medical supplies were no longer produced here, creating severe obstacles as we navigated through the early stages of this pandemic. Premier Ford

committed to changing this critical shortfall, stating that we would never again be forced to rely on foreign manufacturers and their governments for our vital supplies. Through our Ontario Together Program, funding was provided to encourage the re-tooling required to produce these urgently needed products. As a result, we are already receiving personal protection equipment (PPE), ventilators, sanitizing supplies, and more, from Ontario manufacturers.

Dr. David Williams, Ontario’s chief medical officer, has been guiding Premier Doug Ford and his cabinet to protect all Ontarians. Specific guidelines and funding continue to safeguard vulnerable populations, allow employees to continue working, students to continue their education, and to assist businesses in maintaining their operations. With our recent budget passage, the next phase in our government’s response to COVID-19 has begun. Bill 229, Ontario’s Action Plan: Protect, Support, Recover, is a \$45-billion plan with three pillars. The plan includes \$15.2 billion for increased health investments to protect people from this deadly virus. It also included \$13.5 billion in total direct support for families, workers, and employers, in addition to \$11.3 billion in cash flow support. We worked hard to remove barriers to our

recovery through initiatives such as our Red Tape Reduction Ministry and by providing \$4.8 billion to protect and create jobs.

Over the year, there have been many controversial issues, but there was little disagreement over the need to get our children back to school this September. Our Minister of Education, Stephen Lecce, was tasked with this challenging job of addressing the needs and demands of the students, parents, staff, and other stakeholders. He worked with ministry and school board officials to develop a system of virtual and in-class education. The successful and safe return of our children, teachers and staff to school was our number one priority. Our government committed an additional \$1.3 billion to school boards to hire more teachers and support staff, provide remote and alternative learning, and supply PPE and sanitation equipment. The greatest challenge was the hiring of qualified teachers, as all available resources had been exhausted. After months of negotiations with the teachers’ unions to reach an agreement for a one-year suspension of regulations restricting the hiring of retired teachers, last month, an agreement to employ retired teachers for 95 days was reached. The situation was so dire that some school boards were forced to hire parents to supervise students in the classroom.

Canadians are known worldwide for their ability

to respond to emergencies with determination and generosity, and this pandemic’s response serves to reinforce that reputation. There is apparent optimism, as the first vaccines start to arrive in the country and the promise it brings of our former way of life. To ensure an efficient and safe rollout, we have assembled a Vaccine Distribution Taskforce under General Rick Hillier (Rtd). Logistic and medical experts have developed a priority list to protect the most vulnerable and achieve the greatest success. It is a health undertaking unlike any ever conducted in this county, and we need everyone’s patience and cooperation.

This year’s pandemic changed everyone’s lives in this country, and I often was asked about the changes at Queen’s Park and my role in Toronto. There was the

obvious difference of the summer session required to debate and push through legislation to address Ontarians’ needs. Our government debated and passed ten private members’ bills and twenty-six government bills, of which six had unanimous consent. The accelerated legislative agenda required many additional hours of committee time when we had to find places to set up our computers because attending in person did not allow for social distancing. Life in Toronto was also quite different, with air and rail transportation and restaurants unavailable for a good portion of the time. The government and the opposition reached an agreement on some temporary changes that allowed the legislature to continue safely. The pandemic also generated a

considerable increase in the number of enquiries and requests for service that my constituency staff and I had to handle remotely. This new method of remote service presented challenges for the public as well as for ourselves. I want to thank you for your cooperation.

This Christmas holiday season will be different this year as we continue to follow health guidelines and take the precautions necessary to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus. By planning ahead and using alternative ways to gather virtually, I am sure we will be able to share in the joy of wishing each other a very Merry Christmas and the very best in 2021. As always, remember to stay safe and please don’t drink and drive.

SNC committed to restoring and enhancing public natural spaces

EMBRUN – South Nation Conservation (SNC) manages over 20,000 acres of Community Forest and Lands across its 4,441 square-kilometre jurisdiction in Eastern Ontario.

Guided by on-the-ground data collection and field monitoring, SNC identifies properties every year in need of environmental stewardship and restoration work to protect, restore and enhance natural cover, ecosystem function, and wildlife habitat.

The Conservation Authority undertakes this work in partnership with its

municipalities and relies on the support of federal, provincial and community partners to finance restoration activities.

SNC planted 130 trees along the East York Creek near the pedestrian bridge on Renoir Drive in Embrun to help restore natural vegetation in this area. SNC has also partnered with the municipality to repair streambank erosion in three sections of the creek over the next two years.

The Conservation Authority also allocates significant resources every year to removing and replacing dead or dying ash trees infected by the invasive emerald ash borer and monitoring other invasive species on public land.

Thanks to the support from Ontario Power Generation (OPG), SNC is replacing infected ash trees at the J. Henry Tweed Conservation Area in Russell, and will be gearing

up to remove hundreds of trees from properties in the City of Ottawa.

Several SNC properties including the Leitrim Wetland in Ottawa and the Robert Graham Forest in South Dundas were sustainably treated this year for invasive Phragmites (also known as the European Common reed).

Several additional restoration projects were recently completed or started with the support from municipal and community partners, including areas in Ottawa, Russell, North Dundas, and South Dundas.

Trails at the Robert Graham Conservation Area in South Dundas were resurfaced this summer and new culverts were installed to help alleviate some of the seasonal flooding.

New accessible pedestrian bridges were also installed at the J. Henry Tweed Conservation Area early in 2020, along with

some nearby tree planting.

A newly expanded parking lot at the High Falls Conservation Area in Casselman will also welcome and accommodate boat and trailer parking next year.

Replacement trees were also recently planted, with more planned for next spring to help “spruce” up the park.

Plans are in the works for more improvements next year at SNC Conservation Areas through municipal partnerships and regional investments from community partners.

“We’re proud of the natural restoration and property enhancements we undertook this year, as staff continued to work throughout the COVID-19 pandemic to protect our local environment on behalf of our member municipalities and community partners,” says John Mesman, SNC’s communications lead.

Happy memories of Christmas

CHESTERVILLE – I remember when we still had horses. My big brother, whom I have always adored, would take us all on a yearly sleigh ride at Christmas.

However, invariably, when turning around to come home, the sleigh would always tip, and everyone except him, would fall in the snow.

This became a Christmas afternoon tradition.

Christmas Season began when we took the horses down to cut a tree. Wes would go looking for a tree. He loved to seek out the perfect one. Sometimes the snow would be so high as to cover my boots and all I wanted to do was to get home as quick as possible – never the case!

The other years were oh – so beautiful, and the ride down and back was joyful; full of songs of “Jingle Bells” and being in two horse open sleighs.

The tree would sit on the veranda until the snow was off. I remember feeling very anxious to have Dad put up that tree!

It would be placed in front of the window and everyone would have a say as to its very best side.

It was me who especially loved decorating with the very old, and many homemade Christmas Decorations. It was Dad who set up the tree with its lights. I remember stringing popcorn and high bush cranberries, which gave a festive look to the tree. I loved making decorations, but we just had too many with wonderful memories.

We had fun pulling taffy and shaping it into popcorn balls to hang with string onto the tree, even though they always seemed to disappear before Christmas.

The Masons were always proud of our tree. Mom would invite people from our church to come after the 7 o'clock Christmas Eve service, and we would

proudly serve them goodies baked during the buildup of Christmas Season.

We would have gotten up early on Christmas morning. Mom would have kept me inside to help get the dinner ready.

Dad would be late coming in to eat his breakfast. I would be wanting Dad to hurry through breakfast, so we could get on with a gift opening ceremony. Always, he took his time.

I would attempt to hasten him, but the more I tried, the longer he seemed to take. Perhaps he would say, “a little more applesauce for the oatmeal, please”, or “another piece of toast.” This he would do with a big, teasing smile. They say we should count to 30 with every bite, but I think he counted more.

We would have a little service with a prayer. Helen, at the ancient player-piano, would start the singing of the Christmas Carols – which we loved, everyone of us. Not that we were good singers. We just loved to sing Christmas Carols. Poems were recited or something relevant read. Perhaps Dad would recite something. Dad had an amazing memory and was able to narrate long poems learned at school.

The very first year as a new married couple, I invited Gerry's parents to help decorate the tree. This was new for them.

Why would anyone make ornaments when one could buy them?

Gerry's Sister and Mom made ornaments out of paraffin wax to hang on the tree. Bells were made from my painted red small yogurt containers by hanging a string through their centres to hold an aluminum foil sphere. I was especially happy that even Gerry's Dad strung the popcorn and cranberry garland. He had been so adamant about only sitting.

If the Christmases of my childhood did not enjoy expensive gifts, they did hold the meaning of Christmas.

Christmas Recipes

Tabouleh, a healthy salad with Christmas colours!

Tabouleh (or Tabouli) is a simple healthy Mediterranean/Middle Eastern salad of very finely chopped fresh vegetables with parsley being the number one ingredient and bulgur wheat, all tossed with fresh lemon juice and olive oil. It's refreshing, light and packed with healthy ingredients. To achieve the right tabouli texture, you will need to chop the vegetables as finely as possible.

Ingredients

- 2 bunches parsley, part of the stems removed, washed and well-dried, very finely chopped
- 4 tomatoes, very finely chopped
- 1 English cucumber, very finely chopped
- ½ cup extra fine bulgur wheat
- 4-5 tbsp fresh lemon juice
- 4-5 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- Salt



Directions

- Wash the bulgur wheat and soak it in warm water for 10 minutes. Drain very well (squeeze the bulgur wheat by hand to get rid of any excess water). Set aside. Extra fine bulgur does not need hot water nor too much time to soak before adding it to the salad. If you end up using coarse or extra coarse bulgur, then hot water is recommended and you will need to soak it for 45 minutes.
- Wash all vegetables and chop them very finely.
- Place the chopped vegetables in a mixing bowl or dish. Add the bulgur and season with salt. Mix gently.
- Add the fresh lemon juice and olive oil and mix again.

For best results, cover the tabouli and refrigerate for 20-30 minutes. Transfer to a serving platter.

Ingredients

- 2 cups of flour
- 4 tea spoons of baking powder
- 1 tea spoon of salt
- ½ cup of butter
- 1 table spoon of sugar optional

Directions

- Mix all of the ingredients well until they have a crumbly feel and appearance
- Add ¾ of a cup of milk, any kind skim or fatter if desired
- Mix well once more
- Paint a cookie sheet evenly with butter
- Knead the mixed batter ten times
- Spread and roll dough keeping overall thickness no more than ½ inch
- Cut out with a cookie cutter
- Let cut uncooked tea biscuits rest for ten minutes on buttered cookie sheet
- Place cookie sheet in oven at 400 degrees for 15 minutes
- Eat

- Place popped popcorn with nuts mixed in, in bottom of large roasting pan. Cover with sauce and then mix well.
- Bake at 275 degrees for 1 hour stirring every 15 minutes. Once cooked, spread flat on cookie sheets to let dry, then package as desired.
