WINCHESTER - The North Dundas Council has decided to appoint Theresa Bergeron of South Mountain to the councillor seat left vacant by the resignation of Tyler Hoy on Dec. 1.

Bergeron came up short in the 2018 municipal election with Tyler Hoy winning the councillor position by a little less than 100 votes. Hoy had 1,522 votes as opposed to Bergeron with 1,454 votes.

During the Dec. 7 council meeting, politicians approved staff's recommendation to hire Brian Shane Construction for the building contract, and to EC Carruthers and Sons Utilities Construction Ltd. for the demolition contract. The work is set to begin in the spring of 2022 with an expected completion date in the fall.

The report stated that Eastern Engineering Group had been retained to

to \$1 million, and the lowest, Brian Shane Construction, was \$619,859 plus HST. Following a review of the three tenders, the consulting engineers recommended Brian Shane Construction.

Three bids were also received for the demolition contract with the highest being roughly \$34,973. Staff recommended the EC Carruthers and Sons Utilities Construction Ltd., whose bid was roughly \$16,724, close to half that of the highest bid. Continued on page 3

That was the option they chose.

The decision was made at the Dec. 14 council meeting and later that evening Mayor Tony Fraser called Bergeron and asked her if she would be willing to take on the job.

Fraser said, "I called her last night and spoke to her today. She is looking forward to sitting at the table."

Bergeron will be sworn in as a councillor at the first North Dundas council meeting of the New Year.

While campaigning during the 2018 election, Bergeron said she felt the council could benefit from a female perspective. She believes that the municipality is a business and that means councillors should have business experience and lastly that since farming was such an important art of North Dundas culture a farmer's perspective was crucial.

As a farmer experienced in cash cropping, dairy farming and raising Angora goats, she believes that her



understanding of environmental and farming issues allows her to be in a great position to help the council navigate through modern day municipal challenges.

Bergeron has a postgraduate degree from the University of Guelph. She is no stranger to the boardroom having served as a director for the Canadian Goat Society.

Even in 2018 she was campaigning on the issues of growth, waste and water management all three issues are front and centre in 2021, as the growth in North Dundas exceeds all expectations and presents many challenges as far as getting the community's infrastructure ready for the future.

King's Pizza clean-up begins

The July fire that destroyed King's Pizza in South Mountain left a huge mess behind.

The North Dundas municipality asked the owner of the building to remove the pile of debris left behind.

The clean-up work began

on Dec. 15.

A complaint to the municipality by a resident in South Mountain in September triggered a property Standards Order on Oct. 1.

It was not just that the site was messy it was also becoming a safety hazard. The property shares a well with another property and the danger of contamination was very real. The deadline for the clean-up was Oct. 25.

Nothing happened. And the owner did not respond to the clean-up request.

In a situation like this when something must be done because of safety concerns as well as community complaints, the director of planning, building and enforcement. Calvin Pol is obligated to ask council for permission to get the clean-up done by the municipality. If granted the work is contracted out and the cost is added to the property owners property tax bill.

Pol explained at the Dec. 9 council meeting that three local demolition companies have been contacted for quotes. "Preliminary estimates for clean-up are projected to be between \$35,000 to \$45,000. Once all of the quotes are received, the lowest quote will be awarded the contract," he said.

Getting quotes for the job is necessary as the estimated cost for the cleanup exceeds the \$10,000 threshold, which is the amount in the municipalities policy that sets out when tenders for a particular job have to be given out by law.

Thanks to the pandemic there had been some delays in getting the job done.

Most contractors in the area, who have the equipment to clean up the property, are already busy with other projects.

Mayor Tony Fraser said the cost of the clean-up is not something the general population of North Dundas has to shoulder.

Councillor Roxane Villeneuve questioned the location of the companies, noting she had looked to see if they were local. Public Works' superintendent Blake Henderson said that the EC Carruthers and Sons Utilities Construction Ltd. is on the border with Winchester, while Brian Shane Construction is in Russell. It was noted that the tender was out for 60 days with all companies having a chance to place bids.

"With these contractors that are potentially going to be approved tonight, will they be reaching out to our local skilled trades' companies, such as plumbing, electrical, drywall, etc., to do the work from our own township," Villeneuve asked.

Chief administrative officer Craig Calder noted that the municipality doesn't have the authority to tell the companies who they should hire in terms of subcontractors. It could be suggested, but not enforced. Calder said staff would certainly encourage local participation, but they have no power to mandate it.

"I'd like to thank staff, who handled this, and I also think our taxpayers will be thanking you because when I hear what facilities are out there, and some of the costs that have been associated with it, I think that this is more in line with what municipalities like ourselves can afford," Mayor Jim Wert said. "I think it's going to be money well spent."

The existing firehall was erected in 1979. The building's replacement was approved during the 2021 budget process. It was noted that \$1 million had been approved for the demolition and the rebuild during that budget, and this amount would be deferred to the 2022 budget, as this is when work is expected to get underway.

Demolition is tentatively set for May 21, 2022, while the start date for the new construction is set for June 1, 2022. If all goes as planned, the new Crysler Firehall should be completed by Nov. 4, 2022.

An open letter to the Honourable Lisa Thompson, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs

Please stop the transfer and destruction of landmark heritage farmland to build a prison

Dear Minister Thompson:

I am writing on behalf of the Kemptville Coalition Against the Proposed Prison. It has come to our attention that the Agricultural Research Institute of Ontario (ARIO) is considering the transfer of the former Kemptville College farm property from the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs to the Ministry of the Solicitor General (SolGen), a move that will result in the destruction of heritage farmland to build the proposed 235-bed Eastern Ontario Correctional Complex. The targeted land has a century-long history of farming, education and agrotourism, and served as an agricultural hub for the Eastern Ontario farming community. As the minister responsible, we ask that you do not authorize the transfer of this property from your ministry to SolGen, and instead take a strong stand in support of preserving Ontario's farmland and agricultural heritage.

ARIO continues to own 182 acres of the lands comprising the former Kemptville Agricultural School (circa 1917) having sold approximately 633 acres to the Municipality of North Grenville in 2018 for the development of an Education and

Community Centre, now referred to as the Kemptville Campus. The land still in ARIO's possession is a stone's throw from the campus and includes prime agricultural land, comprising mainly class 2 and 3 soils; it sits prominently at the south entrance to the small town of Kemptville. A large section of the property north of College Street will be paved over to build the proposed Eastern Ontario Correctional Complex, which will also result in the destruction of the numerous serviceable farm and heritage buildings on the site.

A 2014 report by former federal Minister of Agriculture Lyle Vanclief, and commissioned by the provincial government, recommended that the property be preserved in its entirety and transferred to the municipality, but sadly this did not come to pass. From a November 2019 media report in Ontario AgriNews, we do know that current mayor of North Grenville, Nancy Peckford, spoke to both your predecessor, Minister Ernie Hardeman, and our local MPP, Minister Steve Clark, about the municipality's interest in purchasing the remaining land and restoring it to its status as part of the Kemptville Campus. In an October 2020 story in Nation Valley News, Mayor Peckford confirmed that the municipality had asked for right of first refusal to buy

the lands had they become surplus. We learned through a Freedom of Information request disclosure that the lands were not declared surplus, but instead quietly put on hold by SolGen in September 2019, almost a full year before plans to build the "Greater Ottawa Correctional Complex", renamed shortly thereafter the Eastern Ontario Correctional Complex, were made public.

The irreversible loss of this publicly owned agricultural land runs counter to your ministry's obligations including: the stewardship of Ontario's capacity to produce food locally - especially in the context of growing food insecurity and supply chain interruptions; fostering the sustainability and growth of the agri-food sector; and improving the resilience of rural communities. In this time of the climate crisis, resilience must include climate resilience - the property sits within a floodplain - and the protection of arable land wherever possible.

There are many ways for this farmland to contribute to the sustainable growth of North Grenville's agri-food and tourism sectors, and its local economy. The property could be transferred in whole to its rightful place as part of the Kemptville Campus, or leased to one or more farmer tenants, as is successfully done through the National

Capital Commission in Ottawa. The existing buildings could be brought back into use to support farming projects and the A.M. Barr arena could once again be the centerpiece for rural shows and competitions. With the International Plowing Match coming to the site in September 2022, the up to 70,000 visitors projected to attend would be far more impressed to know the land will be preserved for agricultural uses, than to learn that it will be destroyed to make way for a prison complex.

The recent Auditor General's report on Environmental Protection in Ontario paints a bleak picture. That trend needs to be reversed. We urge you to prevent the destruction of this agricultural land on the doorstep of our community. Please say no to the transfer of the Kemptville College farmland to SolGen and begin the process for meaningful consultation with key stakeholders, with the goal of preserving the site as an agricultural resource and an enduring symbol of the rich history of this community for generations to come.

What does your local food bank need?

While food banks are generally grateful for all donations, they usually have a list of items they need. Sometimes, they post this list on their website or Facebook pages, but with so much to do, there isn't always time to do so. Calling before you donate is probably the best option if you want to donate what's most needed.

Having worked at a food bank in the past. I can say that it's a structured process where food banks distribute supplies as equitably as possible to ensure there's food available for everyone in need. Depending on the food bank and what they have in stock, each person or family is given an allotment of non-perishable items based on the number of persons in the household. Some food banks might have meat, dairy, eggs, and produce, but many don't. In addition to some help from provincial and federal food bank organizations, it's seasonal donations from residents, farmers, and businesses ensure some food bank clients receive fresh meat, dairy, eggs, bread, and produce, along with the usual non-perishable items. Some food banks, if they can afford to do so, will purchase these items.

banks need help with the gardening process from getting the soil ready in the spring, to regularly weeding throughout the summer, and harvesting in late summer and fall.

Editorial

Having worked directly with food bank clients in the past, I can say that the donations of perishable items, such as meat, dairy, eggs, and produce are greatly appreciated. Eating a healthy balanced diet is something most people want. I know for myself, with allergies and such, groceries, especially the perishable items, can be incredibly expensive. A loaf of glutenfree bread, for example, is roughly \$8 and it's about half the size of a regular loaf of bread.

Food banks see a lot of donations of pasta, peanut butter, canned beans, and rice. Coffee and tea are popular, but very little is donated and what is donated gets separated into small amounts to be allocated more evenly. The same goes for condiments, such as ketchup, mustard, relish, and baking supplies, such as flour and sugar.

on what's available. Sanitary pads, incontinence pads, tampons, and diapers are also needed, along with shampoo, conditioner, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, and floss.

Butter, margarine, canned meat, nuts, dried fruit, and spices are always good bets for something your local food bank might need, as well. The best thing to do, though, is to contact your local food bank and ask. Or ask yourself, if you were the food bank client, what would you want?

Having received food bank food in the past, I have to say those who receive this help are appreciative, and, yes, in need. No one wants to go to a food bank if they don't have to do so. In fact, if you do a bit of research on food banks and who uses them, you will find that there's a great number of people who need to be using food banks but aren't for assorted reasons



South Dundas hits pause for Donald Hanes Municipal Drain work

MORRISBURG – Contrary to expectations, the Donald Hanes Municipal Drain in the Municipality of South Dundas will not be attended to anytime soon.

"It's recommended that council reject the tender results and allow staff to reapply for permits in the hopes of retendering early in the new year for work to be completed next summer or fall," infrastructure services coordinator Justin Moran said during the township's Nov. 22 council meeting.

Moran said only one bid was received by the tender's Nov. 10 closing, and it was substantially higher than expected. The work to be done was originally estimated to be somewhere between \$35,000 and \$50,000, but the only bid received through the "Bids and Tenders" platform came in at \$188,410 plus taxes. At more than three times what was expected, council agreed with Moran's recommendation. In addition, the discussion led to a request for a staff report analyzing the municipality's experiences with the "Bids and Tenders" online procurement platform. "I think it's the Nov. 10 that jumps out at me," Councillor Archie Mellan said. "I've been saying this over and over again, if this tender isn't resubmitted by the end of January, I'm going to go right through the roof. We've got to get these out because I think that price is reflective on the fact that... doing work at this time of year when the ditches are full... we don't want to be doing work in December [or] in November.' Mellan said he wants to see the tender out in January with work to be completed by mid-to-late

summer at the latest. Moran said he must reapply for permits and would like to wait until those are approved before issuing a new tender. He said he expects the permits by mid-January, which could lead to a late January tender.

Mayor Steven Byvelds agreed with Mellan about the timing of the tender for the Donald Hanes Municipal Drain work. Considering most contractors are too busy finishing projects at this point in the year, Byvelds said he's surprised anyone placed a bid.

"I do have a concern over 'Bids and Tenders," Byvelds said, noting that it's more of a general concern, not one specific to this situation. "I think it's a roadblock to getting more locals and more people bidding. What I'd like from staff is that we get a report on how that went, we've been in a year. We need a good, honest, hard analysis of what that does for us because, 'yes' it makes life

Chief administrative officer Shannon Geraghty said it was the first-year staff has used the platform and they're evaluating it. He said "Bids and Tenders" has its pros and cons, and staff will analyze the data and bring a report back to council in December.

Bids and Tenders (bidsandtenders.com) is an online procurement platform designed by procurement specialists and intended to make the process easier and more consistent. It's also expected to broaden the tender's reach to more contractors, however, as the mayor pointed out, many local contractors are probably not using it.

"There are certain tenders and certain things we need that we don't need to go provincewide," Byvelds said.

Deputy-Mayor Kirsten Gardner agreed. While innovation is to be applauded, she said when there's a change to a system, it's important to keep the old way of doing things available until the uptake on the new system is large enough to sustain it. "I think it's good

sometimes to be innovative," she said. "But I think when we do innovation, I think sometimes we still need to attach the old-school way for a bit. I think it was too much, too soon. When you roll out anything ... always keep the old-school way for quite some time until the uptake is huge. It's not very often that you just drop it completely. In this case, I think this speaks volumes."



"A work from home agreement is a privilege," Guillemette said. "And eligibility to work from home will depend on the nature of the employee's job, current and past performance, operational needs, and feasibility of the proposal. A work from home arrangement will not be a permanent agreement however agreements will be reviewed at least every 12 months, or sooner should the department head determine that changes are required to the current agreement to meet operational requirements."

The report stated that the move to working from home for some employees would not negatively impact operational costs or the level of service to residents. He also reminded council

positions that don't require staff on site for service to residents would be eligible to work from home. He also explained that those wishing to work from home would need to fill out an application, which would then need to be approved by the department heads.

"I just want to confirm the policy will not increase operational costs, will not decrease service levels, and given the move to remote hybrid, can we get advice on the impact of office space, so in other settings where there has been a move to remote; "obviously, it's great for employee satisfaction, so I'm not discounting that; the value of that, and the importance of that, but is there a value on reducing office space requirements?"

Leduc said it could help.

have access to this work from every company, every home option, so he can't say for certain yet how it will impact office space, as it will depend on how many eligible employees are interested in working from home. Leduc said the policy isn't being undertaken with the expectation of reduced operational costs, but that could be a result. He said there won't be any definitive answer on this until roughly a year into the process, as that's when staff will have the necessary data to review and assess the policy's efficacy.

"It's nice to have a policy in place," Mayor Pierre Leroux said. "We know that hiring staff - multiple organizations that I sit at, I've seen that one of the first few questions being asked is 'Can I work from home,' so that's changing the dynamic in the work-life balance

Russell pursues options for municipal land encroachments

The **EMBRUN** township of Russell council was recently presented with the recreational trail encroachment study, leaving politicians with a decision to make regarding residents misappropriating township land.

"I'm really happy to see this, especially when I've been seeing a lot of tree removal along the trail by property owners," Coun. Cindy Saucier said.

Director of parks and recreation Céline Guitard presented the findings during the municipality's Dec. 6 council meeting.

Guitard recommended that onto the nature trail." council direct staff to remove all encroaching items, such as fences, sheds, and bridges, and then report back with an update in February 2022. After a lengthy discussion, complete with council-suggested solutions, Russell's politicians decided to accept the report and to direct staff to come back with more information on either selling the impacted pieces of land entering or into encroachment agreements

with impacted residents. "A total of 80 residential properties have been identified in the report as having items encroaching

Guitard said in her report. "The purpose of this report is to raise the issue with council on how these encroachments are posing a risk to the municipality from a health and safety, and civil liability concern."

Council was presented with three options for potential solutions with staff recommending option one, which was to remove all encroaching items and structures. Option two also called for the removal of all encroaching items and structures, but with an exemption for man-made bridges. For these bridges, a permit and an inspection would be mandatory. The third option given was to leave everything as is and not remove anything.

Councillor André Brisson, who said he was leaning toward option two, said he was 100 per cent for removing resident structures and fences from township property, but suggested leaving the bridges. He said many of the resident properties in question had paid extra for a site next to the park and the bridge gives them that direct access. However, he said bridges should be inspected and if they're unsafe, they should be removed. Coun. Mike Tarnowski agreed.

"I think there's some common sense approaches we can take on this one. Yes, we have seen some drainage issues, I think that's important to note," Mayor Pierre Leroux said. "What if council is open to the idea of selling these parcels of land to the residents in the sense that the ditch would remain ours. I hear that liability is a big thing, right? And if we own the land, we'll always have that liability no matter what. So, if we're able to say to the landowners, 'for the cost of the survey and the cost of legal, we're willing to sell you that portion of land up to the ditch,' and then we look at the ditch. We can look at it like an entranceway, whereas people who have entranceways on rural roads pay for the culvert, they install it, so it'd be similar to a permit for the bridge, similar to an entrance, and that way they're taking liability as well, just like would do they an entranceway. Realistically, if we're talking about liability, if that was our only concern, we would say get rid of everything. But if we can put something in place to give that option to residents, I think it would be worth exploring."

Coun. Jamie Laurin said he liked Leroux's idea and would like to see it explored further. As far as payment, however, he said residents shouldn't have to pay for the

survey, as that's already been done. He did agree that they should pay all legal fees and any additional costs related to that option, should council decide to pursue it.

Leroux asked if there were plans to expand the trail, which would impact this option. Guitard said the trail is already 6.5 feet wide, which is wide enough. She then asked if there was an intention to sell or "get rid of" the trail property.

"To be clear, I have no interest in ever getting rid of the trail," Leroux said. "A hundred per cent, the trail remains township owned. I'm just talking about the excess property outside the paved section that seems to be causing all these liability issues. If we can eliminate that liability, I think there's an advantage to all taxpayers to do so.'

Guitard pointed out that this option will not eliminate liability via the bridge issue if the township maintains ownership of the ditch. Executive director of infrastructure Jonathan Bourgon said there would be no issue provided it was addressed "according to municipal standard, which would include inspections.

Saucier said allowing residents to purchase the land on their side of the ditch would give them the right to take down trees that could impact the look and feel of the trail. Leroux said this could be addressed through the Urban TreeCutting Bylaw, which council has yet to discuss. Brisson agreed with Saucier, noting he's against selling these pieces of land.

Laurin suggested encroachment agreements, which would allow residents to continue using the land but with an agreement that protected the township from liability, while also maintaining ownership of the land. He said this would eliminate the need to remove elaborate fences that homeowners have paid a lot to install, albeit on land that's not theirs.

During the meeting's O&A session, residents asked about the cost of the survey and why impacted residents hadn't been notified before the survey was undertaken. Guitard said the survey cost roughly \$13,000, and added that it is an asset, not an expense. Leroux said the land surveyed was townshipowned land, not residentowned land, therefore it wasn't necessary to contact impacted residents prior to the survey's undertaking. When questioned on why nothing's been done to stop the trespassing, Leroux said the survey was the first step to addressing the issue.

Staff is expected to investigate the potential for the two council-suggested solutions and to report back before the end of February 2022. The report's included in Russell's Dec. 6 council agenda package.
