SD&G OPP lay charges in relation to arson investigation

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Taking care of business

LONG SAULT – It was a busy evening for members of South Stormont Council and municipal staff members. SDG director of transportation Benjamin de Haan made a presentation to council regarding regional waste development. There were several Key Information Reports including ones on human resources, Bill 23, recreation, and the provision of council meeting dates for 2023.

Waste management continues to be an area of

concern for municipalities in Stormont Dundas and Glengarry. Benjamin de Haan, SDG director of transportation, made a presentation to members of the South Stormont Council concerning regional waste development in the united counties. He spoke on the Executive Summary and Action Plan created by a steering committee, made up of municipal officials, and provided for consideration by local councils after the report being endorsed by the SDG County Council.

He mentioned over the

past three years, the United Counties of SDG and local municipalities have been working collaboratively on a Regional Waste Management Project. DFA Infrastructure Services were hired to provide “a comprehensive regional waste management report” which has many recommendations for municipalities to review and consider. He continued how each municipality has their own method of handling waste management with levels of service and costs for collection, different in each municipality. The report allows the municipalities to compare

and contrast municipal waste services and opened dialogue at a staff level. Waste management challenges include closure or expansion of landfill areas, or perhaps moving from a municipal landfill to a private landfill. De Haan mentioned there is a private landfill operating locally and perhaps working together may be able to reduce the cost.

He is seeking future commitment for the four following recommendations. These are to firstly obtain a commitment from local councils to create a “formal Regional Waste Management Working Group.” Secondly to focus “efforts on a collaborative transition strategy during the Individual Producer Responsibility transition in the coming years.” Municipalities will provide accurate financial data to the RWMWG annually and lastly adopt a base level of service across SDG.

Dates for regular council meetings in 2023, which

were provided by South Stormont director of corporate services/clerk in a Key Information Report during the Nov. 30 meeting and it was noted if a date needs to be re-scheduled, notice will be provided to the public as prescribed in the appropriate South Stormont procedural bylaw. The meetings are scheduled for 5 p.m. on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month, with the exception of the months of July, August and December when meetings are held only on the second Wednesday of the month which are Jan. 11, Jan. 25, Feb. 15, March 22, April 12,

April 26, May 10, May 24, June 7, June 21, July 12, Aug. 9, Sept. 6, Sept. 20, Oct. 11, Oct. 25, Nov. 8, Nov. 22, Dec. 13, 2023.

South Stormont director of planning and Building Kyle Doyle provided an extensive Key Information Report on the implications both, locally and provincially of Bill 23, *More Homes Build Faster Act, 2022*. It was noted the legislation, which received Royal Assent on Nov. 28, will affect 10 different provincial acts. More information on the impact of Bill 23 can be found in the agenda package for the Nov. 30 South Stormont Council meeting.

"Why do I need a camera, I have my phone?"


You don't know how many times I have been asked that question. I teach a Digital Photography course at St. Lawrence College and one of the requirements of the course is that each student needs to have a digital camera that allows them to shoot in manual mode. This means that they can adjust the aperture (the size of the opening through which light enters the camera), the shutter speed (how long the opening stays open), and the ISO (how sensitive the sensor is to light.) By being able to do this, they control the exposure and determine how light or dark the images are.

Why is this important? Depending upon your interests and purpose, maybe not, if all you want is to be able to take snapshots. If that is the goal, then you could probably get along very well with your cellphone. However, if you want to create the image rather than let the camera do everything, then being able have that level of control is very important.

Before we go any further, let me just say I regularly use my cell phone to capture images. The best camera is always the one you have with you and often that means your cell phone. The image they can create are high quality and the proprietary software, whether IOS (Apple) or Android, can do some amazing things. Unfortunately, cell phones have

exceptionally small sensors, which limits the amount of data they can capture, and they make up for that with the built-in software. The human in the equation really has very little to do except decide what to point the camera at. Again, if you just want to collect images, then this is a great way to do it. Not so much if you want to be the creative force in your photography.

If you have a dedicated digital camera, then you can, depending upon the model, be able to use interchangeable lenses, each of which can serve a different purpose. You can adjust the depth of field in your images, the exposure, the white balance, the file size, the orientation and much more. As well, because the sensor in a digital camera is much larger than that of a phone, it can collect much more data, leading to higher resolution images. The downside is that a dedicated camera is larger and heavier than even the largest phone.



It all comes down to what you want, quality or convenience. The best-case scenario both the camera and cell phone working independently to fill a specific need.

Next week I'll have some suggestions on the best times each day to create images.



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
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
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Rotary Club of Chesterville hosts Breakfast with Santa

They started short educational courses for farm women, on topics that THEY wanted to learn about.

Above all, Dianne was a storyteller. She was able to find the humorous side of any situation, even crisis. Living on the farm, there were always different levels of crisis happening. Dianne has led the way, forged new paths and been an example to women of all generations. She wrote as a journalist on topics concerning farm women, local politics and more. Her written stories of life on the farm have left others laughing along with her and relating to the situations farm life throws at you.

She loved gardening, painting, feeding huge tables of relatives after a long day of haying, and loving every single person who crossed her path.

Dianne is one of the first recipients of the "Order of Ontario", for her work with farm women. She was also awarded an Honorary P.A.G. degree, for the same. More recently she was inducted into the "Dundas Agricultural Hall of Fame". Followed shortly afterwards, by induction into the "Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame".

Dianne is pre-deceased by her husband Daniel (Dan) and brother Fraser (Buddy).

She leaves behind her brother Richard (Dick) [Doreen Hampton], sisters Maureen (Reenie) [Gerry Doris] and Laurel [Alun Hibbert-deceased], Daughter Laurie [Jacques Chiasson-deceased], son John [Darice Cochrane], Grandchildren Cheryl, Erin [Wayne Brewer] and Rebecca (Becky). 
